"The potential production of the present wells all flowing in the Salt creek has just been tested and was found to be \$5,000 barrels daily.
"The present pipe line capacity is about 42,000 barrels.
"The capacity of the logical markets for the Salt creek crude is possibly 30,000 barrels daily.
"The field is about ten per cent 'drilled up' at present.
"An intensive drilling campaign of six months would bring the production up to 200,000 barrels daily.
