

BEAR RAID ENDS RALLY IN STREET

Total Sales Approximate
2,100 Shares—Exchange
Closes Steady

NEW YORK, Oct. 24 (AP)—A smart rally which developed soon after the opening of today's stock market was checked in the final hour when a sudden bear raid caused prices of various issues to topple before fresh buying orders stemmed the decline. Houston Oil fell back 6 1/2 points from its early high, a number of stocks retreated 1 to 3 points, and General Electric and U. S. Steel sagged to the low at price of the current decline, at 123 and 126 1/2, respectively. Late buying of some of the investment railroads, notably Chesapeake and Ohio and Atchafalaya, contributed to a brisk recovery all around.

At mid-day, a profusion of 2 to 3 point advances was scattered through the list. United Drug and Sterling Products were up 7 1/2. International Harvester 6 1/2. Commercial Solvents, Baldwin and Houston Oil 5 1/2, and Case Threshing Machine, American Express and General Asphalt 4 each.

The closing was steady. Total sales approximated 2,100,000 shares.

Veal Receipts Lighter; Prices May Go Up Some

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 24 (AP)—Veal receipts were lighter than usual at the beginning of the week on the wholesale market today and prospects were for slightly higher prices later in the day or Tuesday. Trade in other lines of dressed meats and in live poultry was normally active at steady prices.

Exchange prices on butter and eggs were unchanged from Saturday and trading was normally active for both fresh and storage holdings in the wholesale market.

Prices on most lines of fresh fruits and vegetables were practically steady with Saturday's ranges in the wholesale produce market. Little new stuff was offered.

Oregon fancy softshell walnuts are now quoted at 24 cents per pound per full sack and 21c for large walnuts of slightly lower grade. Fancy Oregon Franquettes are priced generally around 25 and 28 1/2c per pound in full sacks and are finding good buyer interest.

Wheat Unsettled At Saturday Mark

CHICAGO, Oct. 24 (AP)—Opening unchanged to 1 1/2c off, wheat later showed losses all around. Corn started at 1/2c decline to 1/4c advance and subsequently underwent a general sag. Oats were easy. Provisions headed downward.

Wheat closed unsettled at the same as Saturday's finish to 1/4c lower; corn unchanged to 1/4c off; oats at a shade to 1/4c advance and provisions varying from 5/8c decline to a rise of 10c.
