MENUS

BREAKFAST—Cantaloupe, cereal, cream, baked sausage, cornmeal pancakes, milk, coffee.
LUNCHEON—Scalloped squash with bacon, sliced tomatoes, brown bread, raisin cookies, milk, tea.
DINNER—Hot lamb loaf with tomato sauce, beefed omelette, Swiss cabbage with French dressing, one crust apple pie, cheese, milk, coffee.
 Scalloped squash with bacon is an unusual combination but quite attractive and delicious. The dish is hearty and makes an excellent main luncheon dish.
Scalloped Squash with Bacon
 Three cups baked and sliced squash, 1 teaspoon salt, ½ teaspoon paprika, 1 teaspoon sugar, ¼ cup nutmeg, 1 cup cream, 1 egg, ½ cup coarse bread crumbs, 6 thin slices bacon.
 Add salt, paprika, sugar, nutmeg and cream to sifted squash.

Beat until smooth and add eggs well beaten. Mix thoroughly and pour into a buttered baking dish. Cover with crumbs. Broil bacon until half done and arrange over top of squash. Bake in a hot oven for twelve minutes. Serve garnished with sprigs of parsley.

Bridge Pointers

In yesterday's article, after stating that the score should not affect the original bid, I gave three hands and asked whether they should be bid originally by a Dealer. The answers are given today, and I will now discuss the hands in the order in which they appeared yesterday.

1. Sp: Ace-xx. Ht: Ace-xx. Dth: Ace-xx. Cl: x-x-x-x. (x is any small card lower than Ten).

This is the typical "three-Ace hand." In days gone by, there were many who questioned the advisability of bidding a No Trump with this holding, the popular belief being that some further strength was needed to justify that declaration; and even today there are a few who are too conservative to approve of the bid. I agree with this conservatism when advising beginners or inferior players who are playing with experts, but on the broad question of whether three "bare" Aces should be declared or passed, I am convinced that in the long run the bid is advantageous when the general distribution of the hand brings it within the No Trump category.

WRITES OF LINDBERGH

NEW YORK—Nathalia Crane, 14, lay awake in the night while the lone eagle was winging toward Paris. She called to her mother: "He saw a vision. He accepted a challenge from the gods." With a worthless singleton I would not bid a three-Ace No Trump, and even with a worthless doubton I might hesitate about doing so; but in the evenly divided hand above cited (the hand 2-3-3-4 No Trump distribution) and especially with four cards in the defenseless suit, I can see little justification, except inferior skill for failing to bid.

With No. 2, viz. Sp: Ace-xx. Ht: Ace-xx. Dth: King-xx. Cl: x-x-x-x there would be a difference of opinion among expert players. Some believe in bidding No Trumps with two Aces and one King; others consider it unwise to bid with any strength less than three Aces. I belong to the latter school and would pass No. 2, although I would not criticize a No Trump bid with it as severely as I would with No. 3. Let us compare the two hands. No. 3 is:

Sp: x-x-x. Ht: King-xx. Dth: Ace-xx. Cl: Ace-xx-x.

While No. 2 and No. 3 contain exactly the same high cards, there are two distinct differences. One is that the defenseless suit in No. 2 consists of four cards, while in No. 3 it is composed of only three cards; the former is much safer for a No Trump than the latter.
