NEGLECTED HERNIA OR RUPTURE MAY RESULT SERIOUSLY

In a general sense hernia or rupture means the protrusion of part of the wall of a hollow cavity, usually carrying its contents into the cavity so formed. The brain and its covering may come through an opening in the skull from an aneurism or following operation. A rare formation in the urinary bladder may form a kind of hernia. Again an offshoot of an intestine or a blood vessel may form a hernia of these parts. However, the abdominal cavity is the larger of the hollow cavities of the body and is the site of most hernias.

The abdominal wall. This tendency to weakness is caused by the inguinal canal which carries the cord in the male and ligaments in the female from inside the abdomen to the parts outside the abdomen. Increased abdominal pressure, straining efforts, heavy lifting, or weakness at birth in these parts will often produce bulging and finally structures within the abdominal cavity may be forced into these weak spots in the abdomen.

BOY'S DEATH PUZZLING TO AUTHORITIES

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 26 (AP)—Where yesterday the mystery was concerned with the whereabouts of Earl Pierce, 12-year-old Eugene boy, lost in the mountains near Swishome last Thursday, this morning they concern the manner in which he met his death.
The body of the boy was found at 12:45 o'clock yesterday afternoon just 200 yards from the place he was said to have been left on a deer stand with Howard Rawleigh and Bert Alphin, both of Albany.
A wound on the inside of the right thigh was apparently the cause of the boy's death. How he could have inflicted this wound himself is the puzzle which Deputy Coroner Clarence Simon, Sheriff Frank Taylor and Chief Deputy Sheriff Frank Rogers are investigating today.
Pending an autopsy which will probably be held today, officers are making no implications as to whether the wound was inflicted by young Pierce or came from some other gun.
His rifle found a few feet in front of his body, had been fired, but officers could not explain how it was that the gun was in front of him and how, except by a most extraordinary accident, Earl could have shot himself.

Express Doubt That 'The Dawn' Will Make Trip

OLD ORCHARD, Me., Oct. 26 (AP)—Doubts of doubt were plainly visible today on the horizon of Mrs. Frances Wilson Grayson's projected flight to Copenhagen as details of a "mutiny" became known and as delay in delivery of a new engine forced postponement of a fourth get-away.
Contrary winds, overloaded gas tanks and finally a faulty motor have prevented flights after three starts and the possibility of delay until spring was admitted today.
Mrs. Grayson concluded that it would be impossible for the "Dawn", her big amphibian monoplane, to be put in condition before Saturday. But even that will be reckoning without weather which has played a large part in past delays.
Records show, she said, that October normally has only from four to eight days when trans-Atlantic flying is possible, and already there have been at least five such with the Dawn still firmly entrenched on the silver crescent of sand that is Old Orchard beach.
A Wright motor which was to have reached here yesterday from Paterson, N. J., failed to arrive and a crew of mechanics was idle.

Cougars to Play Orangemen Next; Aggies Favored

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, Oct. 26—Saturday Washington State college and Oregon State meet in arduous combat for the first time since 1924. The Oregon State Orangemen won that point, 14 to 13. That was Coach Paul J. Schuler's first year at Oregon State. Since then Washington State has rusted a new coach in the person of Babe Holtzberry who is putting in his second season with the Cougars. Last year he pulled the Cougars in front of the Oregon State for third place in the final coast conference standing.
Some peculiar trouble seems to affect the Cougars when they play the Orangemen. Call it jinx if you will, but in the 14 meetings between the two since 1902 when they first clashed Oregon State has won 10 and tied one. No matter what the odds are against the Orange team it usually upsets them and the Cougars. Not since 1921 has Washington State triumphed over the Orange.
Saturday's game promises to be more than just another stiff conference clash. There is the added attraction of Stalling Howard Maple and Butch Meeker, the rival quarterbacks for the Orangemen and Cougars. Both are possibilities for all-coast quarter back at the end of the season. They play a flashy speedy game, making long runs, frequent accurate passes and hard tackles.
There is not much in the way of comparative scores to judge the relative strengths of the two teams. Washington State has won from Montana, which means nothing, and lost to Washington. Oregon State has dropped two games to California teams. If anything the Cougars have the more veteran lineup. Each team is strong in the aerial offense.

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Hammer Blows May Cause Woman to Die

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 26 (AP)—Mrs. Madeline Preece, 30, with her skull fractured by blows from a hammer, was found in a critical condition early today by police who answered a summons by neighbors.
When the officers entered her apartment, near the downtown district, Mrs. Preece lay unconscious on the floor with the blood stained hammer near her. She was rushed to a hospital where examination revealed a fracture. It was considered doubtful that she would regain consciousness.
A few delirious murmurs, including "he hit me; he was wrong but he hit me" was all investigators had to work on. The apartment neighbors who summoned police heard a bitter quarrel, sounds of a struggle and a slamming door.
