## Tom Mix in Desert Picture At Star

A plot of villainy and intrigue woven around a gang of the most notorious cattle-rustlers in the west is the theme of the new Tom Mix production for Fox films, "Tumbling River," which comes to the Star Theater for a two-day engagement, Thursday.

A lair of evil and thievery far back in the rugged places of the mountains, by the light of a flickering fire, is where these sinister men plan all of their deeds to fleece the country of its finest cattle and thoroughbred horses.

Conklin and Bancroft in Newest Comedy

A perfect example of modern photoplay comedy construction is now showing at the Arcade theater, where Paramount's "Tell It To Sweeney" is being screened today and Thursday. The picture, a comedy of railroad life as it shouldn't be, presents a new team of farceurs, Chester Conklin and George Bancroft, who seem to be congenitally cast as partners in the business of manufacturing chuckles.

Cut-and-dried ideas are completely absent from "Tell It To Sweeney." The picture brings on a pair of comedians who are so long experienced in the comedy field.

The story, the work of Percy Heath, Monte Brice and Kerry Clarke, centers about a hapless old engineer and his old fashioned stand of the thundering rails, both relics of a by-gone era and another engineer of the modern day.

Of course, there is romance, plenty of it, and this romance serves to bring about a series of spectacular thrills in which a runaway train plays the principal part.

Conklin has the principal part of Luke Beamish, the out-of-date throttle-pusher, while Bancroft is well suited to the part of Cannonball Casey, the Herculean operator of the crack fleet.

Beamish's daughter, Doris Hill, the fiancée of Jack Sweeney, son of the railroad's owner, meets Cannonball, who immediately falls in love with her. Then the trouble starts. Luke Beamish opposes the suit, by virtue of Cannonball's air of disdain at the ancient locomotive, the pride of Luke's heart.

Cannonball tries to bully Luke, who vanquishes him in an amusing wrestling match.
