

STRONG UPWARD MOVE IN STREET

U. S. Steel and General Motors Rally at Closing Hour of Trade

NEW YORK, Oct. 26 (AP)—A strong upward movement in the stock market in the early trading today instigated by record-breaking third quarter earnings of the General Motors corporation petered out for a time in the early afternoon. The temptation to take profits on gains of one to two points, supplemented by bearish selling of U. S. Steel, General Motors, Copper and Houston Oil caused prices to slide down rapidly from their earlier peaks.

General Motors which started the day at 133 1/2, fell to 130 1/2, fractionally under yesterday's final quotations. U. S. Steel, which closed yesterday at 139 1/2, dipped to 136 1/2. Dupont receded to 218 after getting as high as 225 1/2 and International Harvester dropped 5 points from its best figure.

The closing was strong. Numerous stocks reached their best prices of the day when buying was resumed in many quarters in the final hour. U. S. Steel and General Motors both rallied 2 points from their low levels and Russia Insurance, Continental Insurance advanced 10 points; Midland Steel Products preferred was up 8 1/2 and Case Threshing Machine, General Asphalt and Columbia Carbon 5 to 6 points. Total sales approximated 2,300,000 shares.

Active Trading The Rule Today In Produce Mart

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 26 (AP)—Active trading at steady prices on plentiful and unchanged supplies of seasonable fresh produce was the rule in the Portland wholesale market today.

No. 1 California emerald walnuts were moving at around 25c per pound, while Oregon walnuts were taken at from 23 to 25c, according to size and variety.

Local Burbank potatoes were finding good call at from \$1 to \$1.50 per sack for No. 1s, according to per cent grading.

Dairy exchange quotations on wholesale butter and eggs were unchanged for today, receipts were moderate and demand active.

Dressed meats and poultry were moving at steady prices in all cases except for fancy hogs which were easier at a 1 1/2c top. Supplies of hogs were heavier but other meats and poultry were arriving in quantities just sufficient for demand.

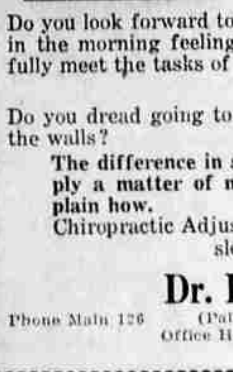
