TRADING BEARISH IN WALL STREET

Buying Flurry in Stock Market Loses Much of Its Momentum

NEW YORK, Oct. 27 (AP)—The recent buying movement in the stock market which had brought a number of issues up substantially from their low levels earlier in the week, appeared to have lost much of its momentum today. The volume of speculative sales, pressing on the general market, drove some of the leaders to new low levels for the current decline.

Bear pressure was focused on the steel group, U. S. Steel and several of the independents suffering severely. Heaviness was also displayed by other high grade industrials, including General Motors, American Smelting, General Electric and International Harvester. General Motors sold as low as 12 1/2 and steel got down to 12 1/2 before a rebound of about a point occurred. Some other shares appeared to reflect urgent selling, U. S. Cast Iron Pipe losing 3 points and General Railway Signal, Philadelphia company, Air Reduction and American Machine and Foundry 3 to 5.

Quite a few stocks reflected constructive operations. United Drug was up 3/4, Rossmore Insurance 5, International Shoe 7 and Hocking Valley 10, the last mounting on odd lot transactions. Banks called about \$12,000,000 in loans during the day.

The closing was firm. Fast moving stocks headed the upward procession of prices in the final hour when a number of shares were substantially above yesterday's finish figure. Market buoyancy was again exhibited by the insurance group. Fidelity Phoenix advanced 7, Continental 1 1/2 and Rossmore 1 1/2. Case Threshing Machine gained 4 1/2 and good advances were accomplished by A. M. Byres, Cluett Peabody and a number of banking shares. Total sales approximated 2,000,000 shares.

Wheat Is Steady, Unchanged Today

CHICAGO, Oct. 27 (AP)—Opening unchanged to 1/2 higher, Chicago wheat soon scored a material advance all around. Corn started unchanged to 1/2 up and then underwent a general war. Oats were firmer. Provisions likewise had an upward slant.

Wheat closed steady, unchanged to 1/2 higher; corn unchanged to 1/2 off; oats unchanged to 1/2 up, and provisions ranging from 2 1/2 decline to a rise of 10c.

Portland Mart Steady; Nothing New Is Offered

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 27 (AP)—The local wholesale market for country dressed meats and live poultry was unchanged today. Hogs continued easy at 14 1/2c for best offerings but all other lines were quoted steady on receipts about equal to demand.

Dairy exchange quotations on fresh eggs were unchanged for today and cube butter ranged steady on all grades but extras, which were bid to a cent lower at 45c per pound.

Practically nothing new was being offered in the wholesale fresh fruits and vegetable market. Trade was active at steady prices for plentiful supplies in nearly all lines.

Heavy rains in California grape districts are expected to put an end to Thompson seedless and tokay grape shipments into this market. Prices on both varieties have stiffened, the former to \$1.50 per crate and the latter to from \$1.50 to \$1.75. Other varieties of grapes were selling at steady prices.

Extra fancy Delicious apples from Yakima were quoted from \$3.75 to \$4 per box.

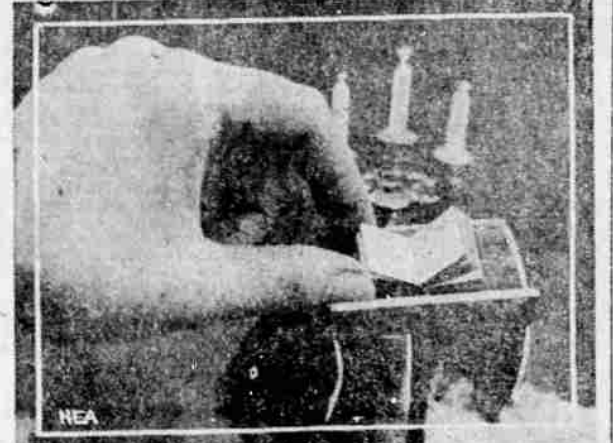
