

EXTRAS UP AND FIRSTS GO DOWN

Shifting of Egg Values Is Feature in Portland Markets Today

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 28 (AP)—Listings on the Portland dairy exchange today showed irregular shifting of egg values. Extra grade eggs were bid up a cent to 51c per dozen, but firsts were a cent lower at 45c and pullets 25 down to 35c. Underbaked were unchanged.

The butter market was generally firm with dairy exchange quotations unchanged except for standard cubes, listed 1/2c lower at 43 1/2c.

Most lines of country dressed meats and live poultry are holding steady with trade demand normally active and receipts sufficiently strong to fill needs. Dressed hogs,

however, were selling mostly 1/2c lower than yesterday's decline at around 14c for top stuff.

Prices tended lower in several lines of fresh fruits and vegetables, while certain varieties of California grapes were quoted at season's high levels on account of curtailed supplies.

California seedless grapes of the Thompson variety are up to \$1.60 @ 1.75 per box. California tokays are held very firm at \$1.75 per box, while Oregon tokays are quoted at the same figure. Sudden nearcites are bid to crop injuries by recent rains.

Red Emperor grapes, a late season variety, are expected to take the place of tokays from now on, these selling around \$1.75 per box this morning, while malagas were quoted at \$1.50.

New black walnuts from the Dalles were offered at 12c per pound.

Lumber Business More Encouraging

NEW YORK, Oct. 28 (AP)—The "lumber thermometer" of business is encouraging, the National Lumber Manufacturers' association reports. For the week ending Oct. 22, virtually the same number of softwood mills show a gain in current orders and shipments over the preceding week, with production about the same. The current volume of business is greater than a year ago. The hardwood industry also was more active than the previous week, but a little slower than at this time last year. Unfilled orders of 230 southern pine and west coast mills were 548,791,305 feet against 559,698,752 for the same number of the week before.

CHICAGO, Oct. 28 (AP)—Opening unchanged to 1/2c off, wheat held near initial figures. Corn started at 1/2c decline to 1/2c advance and later scored general gains. Oats were firmer. Provisions likewise slanted upward. Wheat closed unsettled, 1/4 to 1c net lower; corn at 1/4c to 1 1/2c advance; oats 1/2c up and provisions unchanged to a rise of 1/2c.

Close in Wall Street Is Weak; Heavy Selling

NEW YORK, Oct. 28 (AP)—Selling pressure, which had been intermittent in the stock market since the long decline last week, was resumed in a more extensive manner today. Encouraged by success in creating an air of nervousness in speculative circles by their ability to pound down important stocks, bears forged around and managed to uncover other spots where effective support also was lacking.

Early advances of 1 to 3 points were transformed into losses of as much or more when the selling wave swept the market.

Chesapeake and Ohio and Reading, with losses of 3 and 4 points, respectively, were outstanding weak spots in the railroad section. Some of the week's lowest prices were reached here and there, notably in United States Steel, General Electric and General Railway Signal.

Warren Brothers was an outstanding exception, moving up 1 1/2 points to a new maximum.

The closing was weak. American Express was pushed up nearly 10 points in the face of a rapid declining movement elsewhere. Dupont slipped more than 11 points. Colorado Fuel 7 1/2 and Case Threshing Machine, Abraham and Straus, W. A. Bass, Pittsburg and West Virginia, Houston Oil and Jersey Central between 6 and 7. Total sales approximated 2,000,000 shares.

WOOL REPORT

BOSTON, Oct. 28 (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow: "The demand for wool has been moderate this week with some improvement in the inquiry for fine wools, which are considered relatively low priced. Values are not notably changed for the week. The foreign markets are very firm. Brisbane showing a slight advance. The manufacturing situation is healthy, with demand for goods moderate."

Selling dates for the fall Texas wools have been set for next month. The fall mohair clip has been sold mostly at 54 1/2c for adult hair.
