Rev. Knight to Conduct Last Service Sunday

All Day Meeting to Be Held at Church of God; Other Churches Plan Interesting Programs

The churches of La Grande promise a number of interesting programs tomorrow, with an all day meeting scheduled to take place at the Church of God, Dr. Theodore Copeland speaking at the First Methodist Episcopal church, several special musical numbers on the First Presbyterian church program, and a special "Reformation Day" program at the English Lutheran church.

Church of God
Tomorrow will be the Rev. Nelson Knight's last Sunday at the Church of God here. He will leave Tuesday for Elmore, Wash., to accept the pastorate of the Church of God there. He has been in La Grande for the past 15 months, and during that time has made many friends and accomplished many things in the Church of God. The church and Sunday school membership has been increased about four times since his coming to La Grande, and the young people's department has been enlarged considerably. Workers in the local church regret his leaving, but extend their best wishes.

Who will have charge of the work at the Church of God has not yet been decided, but probably will be Sunday morning. An all day meeting will be held Sunday, when the Rev. Mr. Knight will conduct his last services as pastor of the church. After the regular morning services there will be a basket dinner at noon and in the afternoon there will be an ordinance meeting, with baptismal services.

The Rev. Mr. Knight will also conduct the evening services at the church. The Rev. Mr. Noble, pastor of the Baker Church of God, will be in attendance and will speak at the ordinance meeting in the afternoon.

Sunday school will be at ten o'clock, morning preaching services at 11, the young people's and children's meeting at 5:45, and evening services at 7:45.

First M. E. Church

Dr. Theodore Copeland, of Dallas, Texas, who is conducting evangelistic meetings at the First Methodist Episcopal church here, will speak at 11 o'clock in the morning and at 7:30 o'clock in the evening. Sunday announcements have been made by the Rev. H. W. Parker, pastor of the church. The Rev. Mr. Copeland

is said to be an excellent speaker and great interest has been manifested in his meetings so far. There will be special music at both services Sunday, which will be in charge of W. W. Nussbaum and Mrs. Sherwood Williams.

First Presbyterian Church
The Rev. J. George Walk, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, will speak on the subject "Taking Possession," Sunday morning at the church. The sermon is the first of a series prepared for the 125th anniversary of national missionary work by the Presbyterian church in the United States.

There will be several numbers of special music. Miss Edna Maguire will play a prelude, "Grand March" by Alka and will play the offertory "The Rosary" by Nevins, with a violin obligato played by J. J. Landay. E. E. Hurley, tenor, will sing a solo.

The evening service will begin at 7:30 o'clock and the sermon subject will be "What Does Christ Mean to Me." The Sunday Bible school will hold its regular session at 9:45 o'clock. The Junior Christian Endeavor will meet at four o'clock and the intermediate, senior and young people's C. E. societies will meet at 6:30. All meetings will be held in the church.

English Lutheran Church
A special "Reformation Day" service will constitute the program Sunday morning, beginning at 11 o'clock, at the English Lutheran church. News letters will be read from the Pacific Seminary, Seattle, and from Saskatoon College and Seminary. The pastor, the Rev. L. H. Awe, will speak on the subject "The Message of the Reformation." The special song number will be "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God."

Episcopal Church
"The Path of Wisdom" will be the subject Sunday morning at St. Peter's Episcopal church, given by the Rev. Oliver Riley. This will follow Holy Eucharist at eight o'clock, church school at 9:45 and morning prayer at 11.

The Wayfarer's Guild will meet at six o'clock in the evening and at 7:30 o'clock the study of Christian Psychology will be resumed.

Central Christian Church

Sunday services at the Central Christian church begin Sunday morning with Bible school at 9:45 o'clock, followed by morning worship at 11. The subject of the sermon, which will be given by the Rev. R. L. Putnam, pastor of the church, will be "Our Church Family." The junior, intermediate and senior Christian Endeavor societies will meet at 6:30 o'clock at the church, to which all young people

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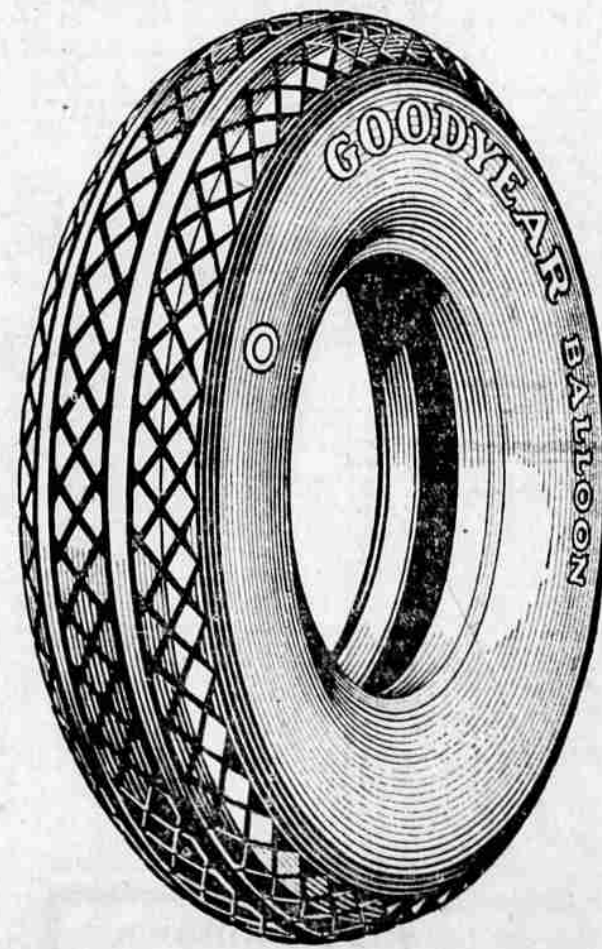
