

BRISK RECOVERY IN WALL STREET

Stock Prices Go Up Despite Stiffer Call Money Rates in Exchange

NEW YORK, Oct. 31 (AP)—Despite stiffer call money rates and the lack of any important trade news, stock prices staged another brisk recovery today under the leadership of the high priced industrials. A few issues were marked up 5 to 10 points, while gains of 2 to 4 points were scattered throughout the list.

American Machine and Foundry was run up nearly 10 points and the American Tobacco issues and Warren Bros. each advanced 6 points, all to new high records. Hosia Insurance, who broke more than 20 points Saturday, recovered about half the loss today.

General Motors continued to respond to the unusually favorable quarterly earnings report. American Smelting, Colorado Fuel, Woolworth, Commercial Solvents, and General Asphalt all recorded substantial gains. Ralls moved forward under the leadership of Atlantic Coast Line, New York Central, C. and O., and Delaware and Hudson, all of which sold 3 or more points up.

The closing was firm. When a few shares developed heaviness in the afternoon, notably Western Maryland and American Agricultural Chemical preferred, prices of the leaders eased off on realizing. Total sales approximated 1,700,000 shares.

Pumpkin Demand High; Halloween Is Responsible

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 31 (AP)—Dressed meat and poultry dealers reported light receipts today and quotations on top grades were riding steady with Saturday's closing figures. Light hens were notably scarce at the beginning of the day for some dealers who had cleaned up well on the week end trade.

Butter and eggs markets were steady this morning with no changes in wholesale listings on the dairy exchange.
Trading activity was normally active in Portland produce markets with prices generally steady with Saturday's ranges.

With Halloween tonight, pumpkins were finding a temporary brisk demand with plenty of local offerings of good quality moving at from 1 to 2c per pound, according to quality. Oregon chestnuts were also in Halloween demand for roasting, selling readily to retail trade at 15 to 17c per pound.
The stimulus of national apple week advertising was in evidence with bigger orders for fancy apples of all seasons varieties taken at prices ranging from \$2.50 to \$4 per box for Hood River, Yakima valley and Roseburg stocks.
