lub Women Hear Discussions on Children's Books

The Neighborhood club program yesterday afternoon was one of unusual interest and was enjoyed by every member in attendance. Mrs. Ingle was the program chair, and in a charming manner she presented a number of modern books for children.

She announced "Children's Book Week" Nov. 13 to 19, and told of her effort being made by the local library to interest children in good books during that week by arranging attractive displays and other features.

A display of children's books, edited by Miss Mabel Doty, is now at the front of the club on added to the interest of the program. Bouquets of gold chrysanthemums, furnished by members of the hospitality committee were used to decorate the room.

The program opened with two numbers, "At Bonny Brook" by Scott, and "The Song of a Daffodil" by Farrar, played by Mrs. Edna Towery.

Mrs. Ingle told of the importance of children reading good books, explaining that the first impression a child is the root of understanding. The first book reviewed consisted of Indian stories, the first of which is a Seneca Indian, "The Rain King's Daughter," by C. Carther. She also reviewed a book of modern fairy tales, including "The Rainbow Princess Who Could Not Cry," "Jan and the Magic Pencil," "The Lamb that Went to Fairyland," "The Magic Umbrella," "The Round Hat," and others.

A book of Chinese stories by Arthur Christman was also reviewed, including "Four Generals" and "The Rain King's Daughter" and others, and closed her talk with a reading of several children's poems from "Silver Pennies," a book of children's poems by Blanche Thompson.

The program closed with several favorite children's songs by Mrs. A. C. Reynolds.

During the business session, which preceded the program, and was presided over by the president, Mrs. Sherwood Williams, Mrs. H. Smith, chairman of the art department, announced the meeting of the department Thursday afternoon.

Mrs. Colon R. Eberhard, chairman of the musical comedy committee, reported on the progress of a show, "Hello, There," which will be given Nov. 7 and 8 at the radio theater. Mrs. Will Adler, ticket chairman and during the evening tickets were distributed among the members.

Mrs. C. H. Seranton, a past president of the Neighborhood club, formerly of this city but now of Portland, spoke briefly. She was presented with a box of candy by the president. At the last meeting a president offered an award to a member knowing the club best by yesterday's meeting. The prize was given to Mrs. L. J. Gates.

MENUS

BREAKFAST — Stewed peas, cereal, cream, sausage cakes, whole wheat pop-overs, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON — Cream of potato soup, toasted crackers, spinach and hard cooked egg salad, eggless bran bread, milk, tea.

DINNER — English mutton chops, boiled potatoes, creamed turnips, omelette and pepper ring salad, apple custard, milk, coffee.

Eggless bran bread is nourishing and economical. It makes delicious sandwiches for the school lunch box as well as the family luncheon. Tiny sandwiches of this bread and butter are nice to serve with a fruit salad after a game of bridge.

Eggless Bran Bread

Two cups bran, 1 cup whole wheat flour, 1 cup buttermilk or sour milk, 1/2 cup molasses, 1/2 cup chopped nut meats, 1/2 cup seeded raisins, 1 teaspoon soda, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon salt.

Mix flour, bran, salt and cinnamon. Stir in nuts and raisins. Add molasses and buttermilk. Dissolve soda in 1 teaspoon cold water and add at once to mixture. Oiled and floured bread pan and bake one hour in a moderately slow oven.

It altogether, because after the first round it is apt to be too expensive.

It cannot do any harm to bid one with any of the four-card suits given in the appended table, because the bid rarely will become the contract; and when it does, it will usually be because the partner has considerable strength to support it. But if the partner should have a trickless hand and the adversaries, for some inexplicable reason, should pass in spite of the great strength they must then have, there might be a loss of 100 or 150 for a defeated contract; but such a loss really would be a gain because the adversaries probably would have made game with a contract of their own had they bid.

The table of approved four-card bids follows:

Four-card Suit Required	Minimum Side Strength
Ace-King-Qn-x or Ace-King-Jk-Ten	None
Ace-King-Jack-x or Ace-Qn-Jk-Ten or King-Qn-Jk-Ten	King or Queen-Jack
Ace-King-x-x or Ace-Qn-x-x	Ace or King-Queen (the holding generally called a quick trick)
Ace-Jk-Ten-x or King-Qn-Jk-x or King-Qn-Ten-x or King-Qn-x-x	Ace-Queen or One quick trick
Ace-Jack-x-x or King-Jk-Ten-x	King

X indicates any card lower than the ton. - between cards indicates that they are on the same suit.
