Klamath Falls To Get a New Depot

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 2 (AP)—Plans for the new depot at Klamath Falls, Ore., to be drawn by Charles D. James, Portland architect. The Great Northern railroad which is putting in new terminals at Klamath Falls for its extension from Bend, selected him for the work. James named Charles N. Coschman, Klamath Falls architect, as his representative on the ground. James had just returned from an inspection of the site. Plans when finished will have to be sent to Great Northern headquarters at St. Paul for approval and construction may not start until late December or early January. Engineer Reports Invention of Device to Reduce Radio "Howl"

WASHINGTON (AP)—Elimination of the howl of a 5000-watt station, only 500 miles away on the same channel, 1660 kilocycles, has been reported to the federal radio commission. Franklin M. Doolittle, president of the company that operates station WJLB at New Haven, Conn., in a letter to the commission, describes an experiment which, he says, practically eliminated a bad heterodyne from Station WJLB at Columbus, Ohio.

Mr. Doolittle, formerly professor of radio at Yale, said: "I rented a circuit from the telephone company between my home and the transmitting plant at Boston Hill, the two points being about five miles apart. The output of the receiving set is connected through a step-down transformer to the line. At the station and the line is connected to the input of a two stage amplifier which compensates for the line loss. As the circuit is entirely of cable the quality is decidedly better. The line could, of course be equalized but this is not necessary for the purpose. In fact, it is rather desirable to emphasize the bass."

"This arrangement allows the operator at the station to hear the program as it is being received five miles distant and if a heterodyne howl is present from Columbus, he then adjusts until zero beat is obtained. This arrangement does not necessitate passing the five miles over the circuit but employs the audio output of the receiver. Our transmitter is of the master oscillator type and we employ a crystal for checking frequency."

"We have had such satisfactory results with this method of reducing interference, I am going to try an automatic control which will start to function as soon as the heterodyne appears. The general plan of the scheme is to control our transmitter with our crystal and to vary the frequency of the crystal by variation in temperature which is controlled from the receiving set at my home."

MISTRIAL IS GRANTED BY TRIAL JUDGE

Kidwell was pale. After he took his seat he looked intently at Justice Siddons. He had his hands clasped tightly in his lap.

"I think it only fair to Juror Kidwell," said Justice Siddons, "to say that two affidavits were presented to the court affecting him."

Justice Siddons then told Kidwell he expected no statement from him; that he simply was advising him of the existence of the affidavits so he might examine them.

Reading a long statement, Justice Siddons reviewed the proceedings of yesterday and said counsel on both sides were in agreement that a mistrial should be ordered, that there was no dissenting voice on that proposition.

The justice added that "publicity—wide publicity"—had been given to the government's affidavits and the proceedings in his chambers, and that this gave added reason for the action the court was about to take.

Kidwell remained around the courtroom with one or two other jurors. He was not placed under arrest and there was no indication what action, if any, Justice Siddons proposed to take in his case.

Kidwell to Deny All
As Kidwell left the court, he said he expected to go to trial on some charge, but that he would deny every allegation made against him in the affidavits submitted by the government.

These affidavits were made by Donald T. King, newspaper reporter and L. Ray Akers, a street car conductor. They declared Kidwell had praised Sinclair in his presence and had said that he would be disappointed if he did not soon have "a car as long as a block."

"I remember talking with King but I said none of the things he put in the affidavits and believe them all to be pure lies," he said. "At no time since I have been on this jury have I talked the case over and at no time have any offers been made to me to hang the jury."

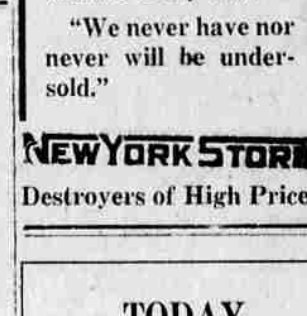
James Shadowed
As the tension of the courtroom let down after court was dismissed, one of the jurors, Charles J. Herzog, tendered to Owen J. Roberts, of government counsel, the regret of the 10 men and two women of the jury that things had turned out as they did. Herzog declared that so far as he was concerned, he had not been approached by any one, but Roberts told him that as a matter of fact he had been.

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shadowed day and night. "The government has not spent a plugged nickel on tactics such as these," said Roberts.

The jury members are to appear tomorrow before the grand jury. The summons did not omit Robert C. Flora, the one jurorman which the government's report did not show to have been under surveillance. Flora said today that the jury did not take Kidwell into consultation when empowering Herzog to give their regrets to Roberts because they did not consider that he was one of them.

Plan New Trial
The government and defense lawyers plan an early conference to decide upon a date for a new trial. The government's attorneys indicated that they would ask that Sinclair and Fall again be called to the bar early in January.

Kidwell was the first of the jurors to be served with a grand jury summons. After he had proceeded for a block from the courthouse two deputy marshals approached him and served the subpoena. He accompanied them back to Burke's office, where he awaited the young district attorney who then was escorted with the grand jury.

Kidwell was taken before the grand jury at 11:14 a. m. by Burke's marshals.

Kidwell was in the grand jury room for an hour and six minutes. When he emerged he said he told the truth to the grand jurors, and would return for further examination later in the day. No money was made to take him into custody.

While the grand jury was in session former Secretary Albert B. Fall, joint defendant with Sinclair in the conspiracy charges growing out of the leasing of the Teapot Dome oil reserve, issued a statement at his hotel disclaiming any connection whatever with the alleged "jury shadowing," and declaring he was ready for retrial immediately.

EXPRESSSES REGRET
WASHINGTON, Nov. 2 (AP)—Expressing regret over the subject of the oil case, Albert B. Fall said in a statement today that "Justice Siddons took the obviously right course."
