DEEDS HIS FARM TO COOLIDGE

3 Found Guilty Of Conspiracy; Arrest Witness

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 2 (AP)—Fred C. Krives, suspended Portland policeman, Paul Panoff and Frank M. De Kay were found guilty of conspiring to violate the national prohibition laws by a jury in federal court here today. An aftermath of the case, the government's star witness against the three, Wallace Walsh, former federal under-cover agent, was arrested on a bigamy charge. He was released on his own recognizance.

At the Krives trial, Walsh testified that Krives entered into a plot with him to afford protection for a bootlegging ring about to start operations in Portland. Krives admitted taking \$100 from Walsh, but said he was planning to expose the bootlegging ring and did not know that federal agents, posing as bootleggers, were working toward the same end.

The indictment against Walsh charges that he married Margaret Walsh at Tacoma in October, 1926, under the name of E. T. Elliott, and that he married Opal Larsen at Vancouver, Wash., in October last year. Records show no divorce from the Tacoma wife.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Nov. 2 (AP)—Opponents of the proposed merger of the Great Northern and Northern Pacific railways today attacked the plan on the basis of its legality under the transportation act of 1920.

This attack was made in cross examination of Ralph Budd, president of the Great Northern who continued on the stand in the interstate commerce commission hearing on the application of the two northerners for permission to unify their systems.

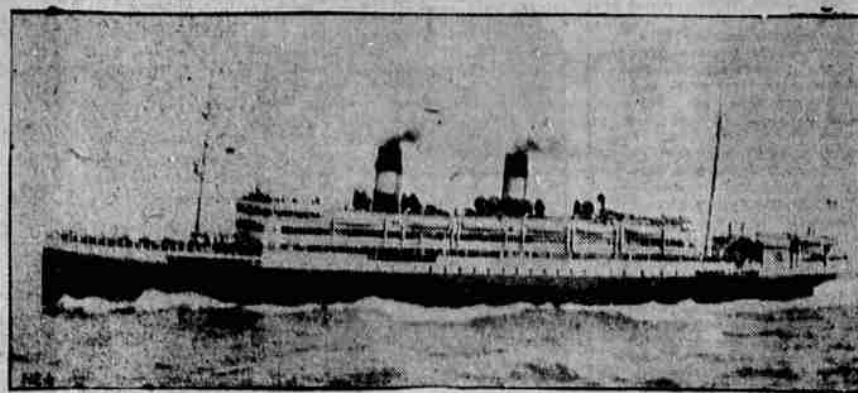
