Pola Negri Coming in "Woman on Trial"

A woman's picture is coming to the Arcade theater Friday and Saturday. It is called "The Woman on Trial."

From reports it tells a crucial story in which all women of all races and climes confront the world with a problem of love, honor and motherhood and ask understanding.

Fortunately this difficult and absorbing role is in the hands of a great dramatic artist—many call her the greatest—Pola Negri.

And it is equally fortunate that the direction of this important screen story was given to a man with the sympathetic temperament and forceful creative ability of Mauritz Stiller, the Swedish genius.

The theme of "The Woman on Trial" is taken from "Confession," a noteworthy stage play by Ernest Jayda, Hungarian dramatist.

It concerns a woman who, in the name of love, carries deeply for one man who is deathly ill, she weaves another to obtain money to restore the first to health.

When her child by the loveless marriage is taken from her through a jealous and desperate scheme she runs true to the instincts of woman and motherhood to regain the happiness of which she has been cheated.

Settings, exceptionally colorful, and backgrounds of the Latin Quarter of Paris, frame the action for a cast which includes Einar Hanson, Arnold Kent and Andre Baril.

"Jesse James" Classed As Unusual Film

Jesse James, an American Robin Hood, if ever there was one, has been immortalized for the generations to come in Fred Thompson's initial Paramount starring vehicle "Jesse James" which is opening a three-day run at the Star theater today.

According to the thrilling story which Mr. Thompson has screened, James was to all intent, hounded by the law for deeds he never committed. When he plundered, it was only to give to the needy. If this be true, America's boyhood hero has another ideal to worship.

And, talking of ideal, there doesn't seem to be anyone else on the pedestal on which Thompson has been enshrined by film fans.

"Jesse James" marks a definite step in the right direction. If we are to judge from the attendance when Westerns are shown, people like them. Here is a Western—plus. It has all the things which are usually found in outdoor dramas—action, wild riding, plenty of fighting and pep. In addition to all these, it has something of value to give.

"Jesse James" might well be considered an historical document. It portrays life during the Civil War with vividness. It takes us on the raids of Confederate cavalry regiments. It takes us into the camps of the Union and, in its lighter moments, it even discloses a water nymph of 1863, with her superlative costume.

The star, of course, appears in the title role. He is Jesse James to the life—a chivalrous, lightning-like, courteous Southern gentleman. Nora Lane, the young woman who appeared opposite Mr.

Thompson in "Arizona Nights" is again his heroine. She's the, er, nineteenth century mermaid with whom Jesse falls in love. Montagu Love, Mary Carr, James Pierce, William Courtwright and Harry Woods are all seen to advantage in important parts.

Dolores Costello Scores As Gay "College Widow"

Dolores Costello in "The College Widow," the brilliant Warner Bros. revival of George Ade's tremendous stage hit of several years ago, is at the Colonial today and Friday. Miss Costello is cast as the daughter of a college president who is about to lose his job because of his inability to interest athletes in coming to the institution. A promised gift is also to be forfeited for the same reason.
