Buying Movement Sends Prices Up In Wall Street

NEW YORK, Nov. 3 (AP)—The buying movement in today's stock market was attended with some irregularity as bear traders continued to ferret out weak spots and test the character of the recent buying in some of the pool specialties.

Selling pressure was directed chiefly against such issues as General Motors, common, Lambert, Green Canada, Southern Dairies A, Foundation, company, and Radio Corporation although the last named touched a new record top in the early trading. Nearly a dozen other issues reached new high ground, the list including Midland Steel Products preferred, American Lincolns, Victor Talking Machine, Adams Express, American Railway Express and Party Talking A and H. Many each sold at least 3 points higher. Norfolk and Southern was run up 5 points and Canadian Pa-

HOGS AND VEAL VALUES IN SLUMP

Carlot Arrivals of Potatoes from Wapato and Deschutes Bring \$1.75

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 3 (AP)—Dressed hogs and veal values showed decided weakness under pressure of heavy receipts in the local wholesale market Wednesday morning. Top prices received were from 12 to 13 cents per pound on prime hogs and 15 to 17 cents on choice veal.

Lambs were steady, as were all lines of poultry with receipts about sufficient for demand.

Most lines of seasonable fresh fruits and vegetables were steady. New carlot arrivals of potatoes were in from Wapato, Wash., and the Deschutes country. A good combination grade of the former was offered as low as \$1.25 per sack and the Deschutes lot, showing very clear condition, was quoted at \$1.50 per sack for No. 1 or \$1.75 in quantities. Potato prices were showing wide variance, according to quality and grading.

All grades of apples are in narrow demand, with heaviest call for combination grades selling from \$1.50 to \$1.75 per box. Grapes were quoted steady.

Butter and eggs were quoted at prices steady with yesterday.

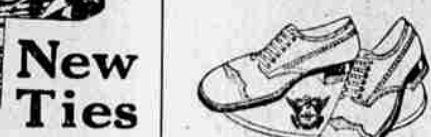
