**DUNDEE, WAXMAN UNDER ARREST**

Champion and Manager Released in Pasadena on Bonds of \$1,000

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 5 (AP)—Joe Dundee, welterweight champion, and Max Waxman, his manager, who journeyed to the Pacific coast for a title bout that vanished in the bursting of a speculative financial bubble, today extended their visit in Los Angeles, under the auspices of the police.

Following an unheralded departure from Los Angeles the boxer and his manager were taken by police officers from an southeast Santa Fe train last night at Pasadena, a suburb, on charges of false advertising, based on Dundee's failure to appear here Thursday night for his scheduled bout with Ace Hudkins of Nebraska. The bout was declared "no contest" when the champion, minus his unofficial \$50,000 guarantee refused to enter the ring. Dundee and Waxman were released from custody on bonds of \$1,000 each.

**Donald Wanted**

Dick Donald, promoter of the fight fiasco, named in another warrant charging false advertising has promised to surrender to the police today.

The warrants against the three were sworn to by Ferris R. Miller, manager of the Los Angeles Better Business bureau, after a conference with city prosecutor E. J. Laskiey. Miller said it was the contention of the better business bureau that "there never was any intention on the part of the three to defraud men of money through their advertising."

In the meantime, the state athletic commission at a secret meeting dumped the entire fight fiasco into the lap of Seth W. P. Strellinger, the local member. The other two commission members departed for their distant homes leaving the affair still unaccomplished and the 17,000 ticket holders still howling for the \$75,000 they paid to see a championship battle and who viewed instead two preliminary bouts and a most smashing fight not by the fight fans themselves.

**Charity May Profit**

Strellinger said that charity probably would reap the sole benefit from the fight promotion. His plan, concurred in by a committee of Los Angeles business men, is to turn over to the Los Angeles community chest the part of the gate receipts remaining after expenses are paid. The proposal was made, Strellinger said, because the thousands of purchasers of general admission tickets were given no rain checks or identifying stubs, while numbers of small boys gleaned bits full of reserved seat stubs from the Wrigley field grounds where the pastboard slips were tossed away Thursday night by their disgruntled owners.

The commission, according to Strellinger, took no action for the suspension of either Dundee or Waxman and made no ruling on the title claims loudly voiced by Hudkins and his followers as a result of the fight failure.

**BEEN STING FIREMEN**

REDDING, Cal.—Bees swarmed by a \$5,000 fire in their apiary at Los Reddes, Tehama county, stung more than 100 persons trying to put out the fire. Howard Mundorff, one of the firefighters, was stung more than 100 times and was in a serious condition.

**Earle Sande Is Barred from Track**



**Oregon to Play Aggies Friday In Annual Game**

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Nov. 5 (Special)—The annual state football classic, the clash between the University of Oregon eleven and the Oregon Agricultural college machine is in the offing and will be put before the public Nov. 11, Armistice day, with the setting on Hayward field. The championship of the state will be decided by the outcome. Both teams are out of the running for conference championship honors so will be "putting" for each other.

Neither eleven has a game scheduled for today so the athletes will be given a much needed rest before the big test. Captain McEwan, Oregon coach, probably will work toward the attack to be sprung against the Aggies as he also has a vacant weekend following the fray in which to prepare for the Washington game in Seattle Thanksgiving day.

On the other hand, P. J. Schisler, Aggie mentor, must prepare both for the Websters and for the Idaho contest to be played in Portland, Nov. 19. This is the tougher assignment and may prove of help to Oregon.

Indications at present point toward this game being the biggest drawing card in the state this fall. Tickets, which were placed on public sale early this week, have been grabbed and taken up and although the entire number of tickets have not been sold, it is believed that they will be early next week.

To cope with the seating Jack W. Benefield, graduate manager, will place "open air" seats on the south end of the present grand stand and tickets for this section will be open to the public next week.

As this is to be the climax of the annual "homecoming" festivities, plans for entertainment of the hundreds of old grads and friends of Oregon are being completed.
