POLICE FAIL TO STOP STRIKERS

Colorado Workmen, 500 in Number, Crash Through State Officers

WALSHEBURG, Colo., Nov. 5 (AP)—State police dispatch to the Southern Colorado coal strike zone yesterday met their first action today when they attempted to stop between 500 and 600 strikers from entering the Colorado Fuel and Iron company mining property in Berwin Canon.

The 15 state officers, aided by mine guards, used pick handles, pistol butts and fists, but were unable to halt the advance of the strikers up the narrow canyon leading to three mines.

The state officers, however, prevented a mass meeting at the C. F. and I. camp at Berwin, where they arrested Amelia Sablich, "the girl in red," and another woman strike leader and a man. The two women were handcuffed when taken to jail at Trinidad as they hit and scratched the arresting officers.

The state police and deputy sheriffs continued their activity after the demonstration and placed 12 persons under arrest.

The county court and commissioners was allowed \$200 additional, which will go toward commissioners' fees and expenses. The district attorney's office was allowed \$240 more than this year for office rent and a typewriter.

A total of \$12920 more was allowed for the court house for next year on account of the janitor's salary being increased \$270 and the remainder to go toward building and repair work. The county farm and water master's office were allowed the same amount as this year, \$700 being allowed for the county farm and \$1200 for the water master's office.

County Aid, Health
A total of \$3000 was allowed for county aid, \$2000 for hospital service for indigents, \$180 for a county physician, \$500 for physician other than county physician, burials, nursing and special care and \$1200 for supplies for indigents, the total of \$6880 being the same as this year.

A total of \$2400 was allowed for the county health nurse, \$320 less than this year. Twenty-five hundred dollars was allowed for widows' pensions, \$500 less than this year, \$400 for the county health board, the same as 1927, and \$2100 for the county jail, the same as this year.

Forty-five hundred dollars was allowed for elections and registration, \$2500 more than last year.

A total of \$300 was allowed for the publication of notices, court proceedings, etc., \$1000 for the Union Livestock Show association, combined with the Union county fair, and \$200 for boys' and girls' club work at the state fair, the total being \$300 more than this year.

More For Agent
A total of \$2700 was appropriated for the farm extension work of the Union county agriculturalist, \$2250 being appropriated this year toward this work. A total of \$240 was appropriated for the children's farm home, \$245 for the seller of weights and measures, \$100 for tax rebates, \$50 for insane examinations, etc., \$400 for coroner's inquests, \$400 for exporting records, \$120 for boys' and girls' club society, \$240 for the Pacific Coast Rescue and protective society, all the same as last year.

The juvenile department was appropriated \$20 less than this year, the total on the 1928 budget being \$309 as compared with \$259 this year. Nine thousand dollars was appropriated for circuit court, \$2000 for the justice of the peace court, \$4000 for emergency expenses, \$100 for the indemnity of diseased cattle, \$400 for patrol of forests, \$500 destruction of predatory animals, \$25 for the county judges' and commissioners' association, all the same as last year.

Denies Stories That J.C. Penney Co. Is To Merge

Setting aside rumors which connected the J. C. Penney Co. with other organizations, M. M. Hunt, manager of the local J. C. Penney Co., store said this morning, "There is absolutely no foundation for any statement indicating that the J. C. Penney Co. is to be merged with or acquired by any other organization. A rumor has been persistent over the Northwest recently that a change of ownership is impending, but nothing of the kind exists."

"This company which was founded 25 years ago is now the largest chain group in the world in the department store field and this year it is anticipated that the total volume of sales will reach \$150,000,000."

"During the past few months important purchases of other stores and small chains of stores in the Northwest and along the Pacific Coast have been made by the J. C. Penney Co., and the general program of operation has been broadened."

"J. C. Penney, who founded the company in Kemmerer, Wyo., in 1902 is chairman of the board of directors and the active management of the organization is in the hands of the men who have built it up from its original start."

"As the result of a plan worked out by the board of directors early this year, the individual store managers are now stockholders in the J. C. Penney Co., as well as participants in the returns from the stores which they manage."

Stanford's 49-yard line. Tessaun attempted a pass which was grounded. Another incomplete pass sent the Huskies back five yards for a penalty. Tessaun punted 43 yards to Hyland. Hyland failed to gain at center and Hoffman punted to Tessaun in midfield. Tessaun shot off-tackle for 19 yards to Stanford's 50-yard line. Carroll duplicated the trick on the next play, going through center for another first down on Stanford's 15-yard line. Carroll smashed through left tackle for six more yards and Tessaun followed suit with five more and a first down. With the ball inside Stanford's five-yard line, Carroll fumbled and Lewis recovered for Stanford. Hoffman fumbled but recovered for a three-yard loss, putting the ball on the Cardinal's one-yard line. Hoffman, standing 10 yards behind the goal line, punted 40 yards to Tessaun, who returned eight yards. Tessaun lost three on an attempt at center and then shot an 11-yard pass to Schul on Stanford's 21-yard line. Hyland intercepted a Washington pass and punted 28 yards to his own 36-yard line before being tackled. Two double reverse plays netted a four-yard loss and a pass was incomplete. Hoffman punted 44 yards to the Huskies' 28-yard line as the gun ended the period.

Pass Nets Score
Tessaun punted to Stanford's 36-yard line. On a double reverse, Hill lost nine yards and Hoffman punted out of bounds on Washington's 35-yard line. Tessaun punted to Hyland who returned it seven yards to his own 41-yard line. A pass Hyland to Harder gained 15 yards. Hoffman punted to Gehman who returned to his own 14-yard line. Tessaun's punt was partially blocked, rolled 19 yards out of bounds on his own 34-yard line. This gave Stanford the ball. On the next play Hyland dropped back about 10 yards and shot a short pass to Preston who raced 24 yards through the Husky defense to cross the Washington goal. The try for point failed.
