

Eastern Oregon Wool Wins Prize At Annual Show

At the first annual wool show sponsored by the Pacific Cooperative Wool Growers and held in connection with the Pacific International Livestock Exposition at Portland, Oregon, October 28 to November 6, fleeces exhibited by Eastern Oregon growers came in for their share of the prize money and ribbons.

Geo. T. Willingmyre, head of the wool standardization work of the United States Department of Agriculture, who came out from Washington, D. C., to judge the show, said that it was without exception the best wool show and the finest collection of fleeces he had ever seen. Nearly a hundred fleeces were entered in the breed show, the commercial wool show and mohair show.

The J. E. Smith Livestock Co., of Pilot Rock won first, second, third, fourth and fifth prizes in the breed show for Delaine ewe fleeces, and also won fourth, fifth and sixth places for Fine Staple wool in the commercial wool show. W. B. Harritt & Son of Heppner
