Armistice Day Church Program Will Be Sunday

Presbyterians and Methodists Plan Services—Pageant to Be Given at Christian Church.

Several church services arranged for Sunday are of more than ordinary interest. Included in these are the "Armistice Day" programs at the First Presbyterian church and the First Methodist Episcopal church and the presentation of a pageant during the evening at the Christian church.

The Rev. J. George Walz, pastor of the Presbyterian church, will speak at 11 o'clock Sunday morning on "Peace Propaganda" in remembrance of Armistice day which has so much history behind it. "War precedents were crude—wars were fought for war's sake, and for material gain," he declares. "Armistice day marks the termination of the war to end war and 'Glory' guards with solemn round the bivouac of the dead." New members will also be received at this hour.

At this same service Mrs. Harley Richardson, organist, will offer three special organ numbers: "Song Without Words" by Engelmann, "Chanson Triste" by Tschakovsky, and "Hercules" (Jocelyn) by Godard.

In the evening the hour will be given to song which will include organ numbers by Miss Edris Maguire as follows: "Tannhauser March" by Wagner, "Une Larme et un Souffle de Bagatelles No. 2" by Edouard Schmitt, and a sermon by the pastor on "Expecting to Find God."

The Sunday school will meet at the regular hour in the morning. Junior C. E. meets at 4 p. m. and the intermediate seniors and young people at 6:30 p. m.

Christian Church
A special program will be given at 7:30 p. m. at the Central church of Christ when the Women's Missionary society will present a pageant entitled "Brotherhood's Adventures in America."

Bible school will begin at 9:45 a. m. and the morning worship hour at 11 o'clock. The sermon, presented by Mrs. R. L. Putnam, will be on "Eyes That See Not."

A Christian Endeavor meeting at 6:30 o'clock.

An official meeting of the church board is announced for Monday at 7:30 p. m. and church night will be observed Thursday at 6:30 p. m.

Baptist Church
At the First Baptist church, following Sunday school at 9:45 a. m., the preaching service will begin at 11 o'clock and the subject will be "The Christ Driven Away." After the service the Lord's Supper will be observed.

In the evening the worshiping will begin at 7:30 o'clock and the sermon subject will be "The Final Hour." E. Y. P. C. meets at 6:30 p. m.

Episcopal Church
The evening service of the Holy Communion and a sermon by the Rev. W. M. Bradner, rector of the Cove church, will feature the morning worship hour at the St. Peter's Episcopal church, which begins at 11 o'clock following Holy Eucharist at 8 a. m. and church school at 9:45 a. m.

The evening service will consist of an address by Dr. R. G. McCall on "The Brain and the Glandular System." The lecture will be illustrated.

Wayfarers' Guild meets at 6 p. m. on hour and a half before the evening services.

Sees Slim's Vision

Wan and weary in her cell, Miss Trickey told a reporter that she awoke in her cell every morning before dawn and saw the vision of her husband smiling down on her.

"I can see his face just as plain," she said with a strange note in her voice. "He is just up there and he smiles down on me every night."

Harris, a noted rodeo rider, was slain on the night of Sept. 2 when a dagger was plunged through his heart. Miss Trickey at first told a mysterious assistant who leaped out of the dark, but later admitted she killed her lover. The couple had been living together, but were not married, investigation revealed.
