



\$8,000 HOME TO BE BUILT HERE

Building Permits for First Week Of November Amount to \$8,850

Building permits for November started off promisingly last Tuesday, the first day of the month, when Mrs. S. C. Zuber applied for a permit to construct an \$8,000 home on Seventh street between Spring and Pennsylvania avenues. The dwelling place is to be one story.

Total permits for the first week of the month amounted to \$8,850. In addition to the permit issued to Mrs. Zuber, the following applications to build were made: Nov. 2—South Methodist Episcopal church, to erect a garage on Fir between Jackson and W., to cost \$100.

Nov. 2—Walter Parker, to alter and repair a dwelling on Depot between W and V, work to cost \$500. Nov. 5—Winford Pearson, to erect a garage on Fourth between Washington and M., to cost \$250.

Farm Pointers

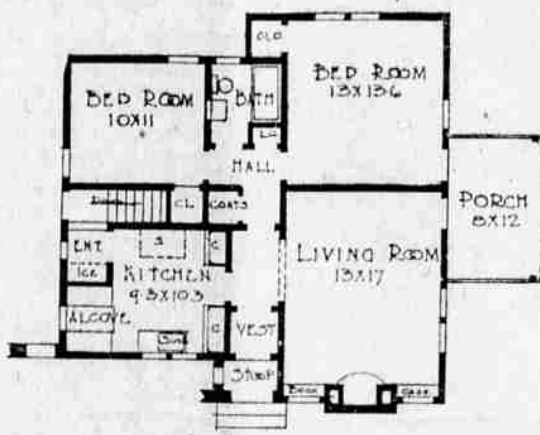
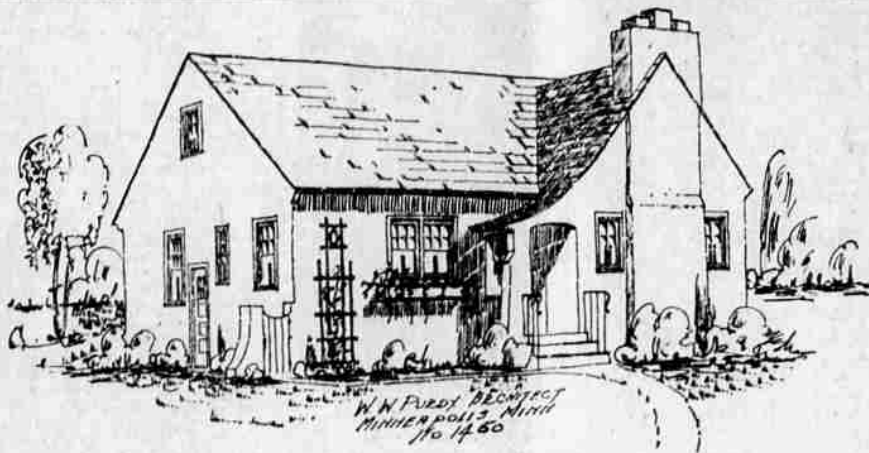
Plow bottoms will rust in damp Oregon weather if it is put away without protection. Some farmers secure this protection by smearing paint on the bottom and taking it off in the spring with a strong lye solution. Others use axle grease. Careful farmers also grease the under knoter and similar parts when they put their machinery in the implement shed. They also remove belts and canvases as these would either stretch during the winter or injure the machinery.

Carrots are fed to laying hens by many successful Oregon poultrymen. They are high in vitamins and tend to keep the hens busy. The general practice is to hang the carrots about the chicken house at the proper height.

Fall grain in Oregon sown late is done at a thicker rate in order to make up for lack of stooling. Wheat is sowed at not less than two bushels and oats at not less than three bushels per acre. Deep sowing at this time is likely to cause rotting of the seed as the soil is getting rather cold and wet, advises the experiment station.

AN ENGLISH COTTAGE

It would be difficult to find a more pleasing little home than the one here pictured. The broad frontage has been placed so as to face the street, thus making the house appear much larger than it really is. The massive chimney, wood trellis, service gate, are all features that are a little unusual. Entrance is into a little center hall, which opens direct into the large living-room, with its massive fireplace. A door from this hall leads into the kitchen, which is most complete, with its breakfast alcove. When "company comes" a gate-leg table is brought into use in the living-room.

Two bedrooms and bath open off a small rear hall. There is good storage space in the attic, while a full basement provides additional storage space, if built on a hillside, an ideal place for a basement garage. The finish used is fir, stained throughout, with oak floors, tile in bath, linoleum in the kitchen. The walls are a rough texture, painted, and the wrought iron lightning fixtures give a most pleasing and homelike effect.

White cement plaster is used on the outside, with brown stained trim, stained shingled roof. Of first class construction, it is estimated that this home can be built for from \$4,500 to \$5,500, exclusive of heating and plumbing.

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 7 (AP)—In estimating the contributions that will be levied against each state activity, department and institution during 1928 for maintenance of the restoration fund the state board of control has found that the personal property owned by some 85 activities totals a value of \$17,553,580. The restoration fund for the year, according to law, is \$50,000. This fund is the state's fire insurance scheme.
