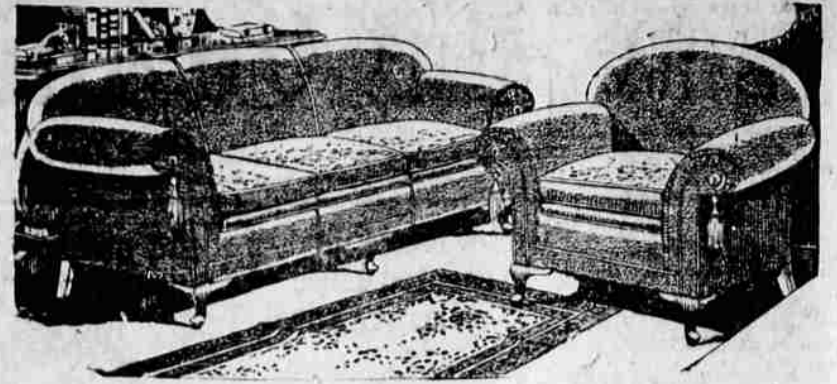
### Forger to Serve 15 Months in Pen

### Bonus in Coast League May Go To Winning Club

### Briante Out to Beat Red's Mark

NEW YORK, Nov. 8 (AP)—With three games to go, "Tom Yards" Briante, line-cracking ace of the New York university, is bent on smashing the ground hitting record Red Grange set in 1922.

In seven games this season, statisticians discovered, Briante has plunged through opposing defenses for a total of 1161 yards for an average of 7.93 yards per play. He has clicked off 222 yards for each minute of play and has yet to be stopped for "no gain."

Back in 1922, when the Gallatin Ghost of the Illinois backfield was performing in wonder fashion, experts set his seasonal gain at 1264 yards last Saturday Briante hammered 167 yards in 40 minutes of play, including one dash of 33 yards.
