Work to Begin Soon on Model Chicken House

Work is to be started very soon on the fine new chicken house for the East Oregon Experiment station, near Union, according to Mr. Withycombe, the superintendent. The station has not been looking into the chicken end of the business for so very long, but they have a very good start there now, according to Mr. Withycombe, and they intend to carry on the work the best they can. The purpose of the station, says Mr. Withycombe, is not to find methods, etc., which will benefit the farmer in the business, for purely commercial purposes, but rather for the farmer, and his wife, who are not making this, perhaps, the big feature on their farm, but as a side-line, they want it to pay, and not be a liability as is sometimes the case. It is for this purpose that the work is being enlarged in poultry lines.

The new house is to be 20x70 feet and will face the south. The foundation and floors will be of concrete. The building will be of frame construction, one-story, and will be provided with curtains for the more severe weather. The house is to be used, in all respects, the house will be built to conform to what is now conceded to be the very best in the poultry game, with such modifications as the original plans as proposed by state officials, as will be necessary to meet conditions in eastern Oregon. The house will accommodate 400 laying hens.

The Plymouth Rock is the breed of chickens found at the station at present. Five hundred baby chicks of a very good strain were secured last spring. The plan which will be followed, according to Mr. Withycombe, is to dispose of about 250 of these during the season. Then next spring 500 more will be secured, and during the year following 250 will be sold. The idea for the station being to secure 500 chicks each spring and disposing of half that number, increasing the flock in that manner.

Careful observations are made in regard to feeding, etc., in an effort to ascertain what is best to feed, how, in what quantities, etc. Also, disease, county lecturer, Dr. H. E. Fox, gave a very interesting program in the afternoon and the ladies of the Home Beauties (Crack) gave a delicious dinner. CIVIL WAR VETERAN OF ALICE ATTENDS 5TH NATIONAL MEET

E. M. Murphy, of Alice, will be 82 years of age next January. He is not a pioneer of this valley, for it has been his home for less than a decade. But he is one of the very few veterans of the Civil war, who still reside within Union county. Where there were formerly posts of the Grand Army of the Republic in several of the towns of this county, and where there were in most of the smaller communities one or more of the veterans, now the number is pitifully small, with only one or two towns having any of the old soldiers as residents. But Mr. Murphy is hale and hearty for his years, and week before last he returned from a very extensive trip during which he attended the national encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, held at Grand Rapids, Michigan.

This was the fifth national encampment which Mr. Murphy had been privileged to attend and it was among the most stirring. There were only about 750 or 800 of the boys who wore the blue in attendance, and the parade, in which they nearly all shared, was witnessed by what has been estimated as 50,000 people. One old soldier marching in line was 99 years old, yet he walked along proudly, needing not even the assistance of a cane. The gathering was inspiring to the comrades and to the citizens of the city which acted as host, as well.

Mr. Murphy was a boy only 16 years of age, when the Civil war broke out. Like all the boys of his time, he was eager to join the army, but was not permitted to do so. However in 1862, when he reached his 18th year he enlisted in company E, 144 New York Infantry, organized under General Gilmore at Andes village, near Delhi, New York. He saw a year and a half in the service before he received his honorable discharge. On his recent visit to his old home in the Empire state he could find only two of those who had enlisted with him.

But the national encampment was not all of Mr. Murphy's trip. He left Alice on May 22nd, going first to Red Oak, Iowa, where he had lived for a short time after the close of the war until he came to this state. From there to Adrian, and Jackson, Mich., then to Cincinnati, Ohio, all the while visiting among relatives, for the most part nieces and nephews, who gave him their hearty hospitality. Going on to New York City, he was met by two nephews, whom he had not seen for 34 years. For several weeks he visited around in different sections of eastern New York, including some time in the city itself. Three days were spent at Ithaca, and a half day at Binghamton. Mr. Murphy is of the opinion that those whose names he has carried him enough miles in their car to show him the sights of their respective localities, to have more than brought him clear back home. One visit gave him an exceptional thrill and that was Oyster Bay, where he saw the grave of Theodore Roosevelt. Up and down the valley he was taken, past the estates of the rich, including Jay Gould and others. It was on his return trip home, that he visited Grand Rapids.

From here to Omaha, Mr. Murphy traveled in a sleeper, but from there on he did his traveling by day, as he wished to see the country through which he was passing. This is his fifth trip back east, but it is the first in more than 20 years to the extreme eastern coast. The trip was made by Mr. Murphy entirely alone, and he had no difficulty whatever, but apparently enjoyed every mile of the way. His intense desire to see the days of his boyhood, and to visit once more with any of his old comrades and friends in Sumnerville.

A SEASONABLE RECIPE

COCOANUT CRUSTIES
Make a pastry by cutting into 2 cups well-sifted flour, to which 1/2 teaspoon salt has been added; 1/2 cup shortening. Add four tablespoons lemon juice. After cutting the dough, roll out to 1/4 inch thickness and cut any shape desired. Spread with a thin coating of hard sauce and cover with coconut, moistened with lemon juice.

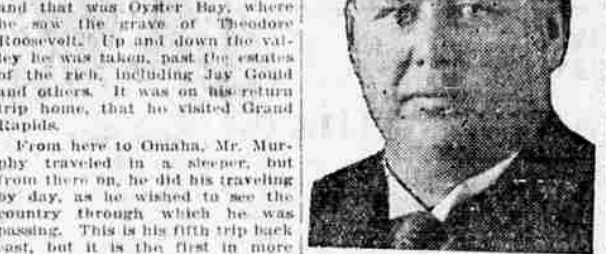
