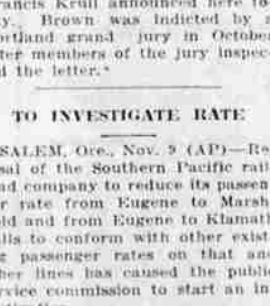

DECISION HELD AS VARE VICTORY

U. S. Court Rules No Jurisdiction on Existence of Senate Committee

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 9 (AP)—The United States circuit court of appeals today upheld the federal district court in the opinion that the question of the existence of the senate committee is a matter for the U. S. senate to decide and not the courts.

The decision was in the case of the senate special committee of which Senator Reed, of Missouri, is chairman. This committee was appointed by the senate to investigate primary campaign expenditures in various states. The committee tried to obtain ballot boxes in Delaware county containing the vote cast at the last senatorial election in which William S. Vare, republican, defeated on the face of the returns, William B. Wilson, democrat. Wilson contested the election.

Up to Senate
The Delaware county authorities refused to give up the boxes on the ground that the Reed committee was no longer legally in existence. The committee took the case to the U. S. district court and Judge J. Whitaker Thompson decided it was for the senate to decide the status of its committees.

Judges Buffington, Whoolley and Davis of the appellate court, affirmed the action of the lower court and adopted Judge Thompson's opinion as their own.

Victory for Vare
The decision was regarded as a victory for Senator-elect Vare, coming on top of his sweeping triumph at the polls yesterday when his candidate for mayor of Philadelphia was elected.

Senator Vare, backed by Senator David A. Reed, of Pennsylvania, favored the turning over of all the ballots in Pennsylvania not to the Reed special committee but to the senate committee on privileges and elections of which Senator Watson, of Indiana, is chairman.

Pardoned Slayer Given X-Ray Exam
PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 9 (AP)—John A. Pender, pardoned slayer held in connection with an attack upon a 15-year-old Portland girl, was given an X-ray examination today at the request of his attorney, who sought to show him deranged as a result of a blow from an ax when a boy.

Sen. Fouts, his attorney, has pressed for a sanity hearing, whom Circuit Judge Casswell has twice refused. The district attorney's office has opposed every move to prevent a trial on a statutory charge, which was lodged against Pender, following his arrest in a police trap two weeks ago.

FAIRM ORGANIZATIONS
WASHINGTON, Nov. 9 (AP)—An effort by three major farm organizations; the American Farm bureau federation, the National grange and the Farmers' Union, to reach an agreement on farm relief legislation was under way today behind closed doors at the offices of the National grange.

It was not disclosed what manner of compromise was being sought to unite the groups but spokesmen promised a statement later explaining progress of the parley.

BODY IN WRECK
MARSHFIELD, Ore., Nov. 9 (AP)—Fate pursued Obed Miller even beyond life. Miller while hunting from a rowboat in Ten Mile lake upset his craft and drowned and his body was recovered after many hours dragging. O. Peterson of North Bend, while bringing the body to North Bend late yesterday wrecked his automobile going over a 15-foot embankment. Peterson and two others with him escaped injury and another vehicle was dispatched to bring Miller's body to the undertaker's parlors.

LORENA AND REPORTER IN CELL 4 HOURS
KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Nov. 9 (AP)—Probably no murder suspect has ever received such a protracted interview as that undergone by the colorful little rodeo star, Lorena Trickey, charged with the murder of J. P. (Smiling Slim) Harris.

The story was hushed for a few hours but was too good to keep. W. H. Perkins, Lakeview Association Press correspondent, was granted an interview with Miss Trickey. At 7 o'clock Monday night Miss Trickey's cell door opened to receive the newspaper man. It closed behind him, and the jailer locked the door—determined that no chance would be taken of losing his famous prisoner.

Time passed. Perkins secured his interview, arose, bid farewell to the rodeo star and tried to open the cell door. It was locked. Shouts failed to attract the jailer. He, in the meantime, had forgotten about Perkins and gone home for the night.

The hour hand on the clock made four complete revolutions and was on its fifth when shortly after 11 p. m. Sheriff E. A. Priddy decided he would give the jail a last inspection before going home to bed. He found "Pork" and Lorena chatting affably inside the cell.

"He would have been in there until morning if I hadn't called," the sheriff said.
