PETITION ON
FILE AGAINST
CITY MANAGEROne Hundred Seventy
Signers Ask for Re-
moval of CrewsEXTRAVAGANCE IS
ONE OF CHARGESPetition Also Alleges That
City Manager Is Ineffi-
cient and Asks New Ap-
pointment.

A petition, signed by 170 persons and directed against City Manager W. C. Crews, was filed with City Recorder J. E. Stearns yesterday afternoon at about 4 o'clock and was presented to the city commission at its regular meeting last night.

After the reading of the petition and a short discussion, A. T. Hill, president of the commission, expressed the opinion that not all of the signers were eligible and directed the city recorder to investigate the status of the signers and learn whether each one was a taxpayer and legal resident of La Grande. On motion, Mr. Hill was instructed to appoint a committee of five men to investigate the charges made against Mr. Crews. Mr. Hill stated that he would announce the personnel of the committee later in the week.

The petition, which was filed by Stanley Stiles, according to city officials, follows:

"We, the undersigned voters and residents of the city of La Grande, Oregon, respectfully petition your honorable body to remove the present manager of the city, W. C. Lumber Company
Will Shut Down
Mill At WeekendBowman-Hicks to Continu-
e to Operate Planer,
However—Firm Must
Reduce Lumber Stock.

With the end of this week the Bowman-Hicks Lumber company's saw mill here will be closed down for a period of time, H. N. Ashby, general manager for the company here, announced this morning.

"We are closing down to decrease our inventory, and the length of time the mill will be down depends on how fast we can sell and ship lumber," Mr. Ashby said. "It is necessary that we remain closed until our present stock is down to where we want it."

The shutdown is the result of a steady decrease in production for several months due to the condition of the lumber market, which began with dropping to one shift, so that the men who are actually removed from the company's payroll at this particular time is comparatively small.

Close Wallows Mill
The company's mill at Wallows will also be effected by the shutdown, laying off about 50 men there and between 60 and 70 here. The planing mills, however, both at Wallows and here, will continue to operate, about 125 men being employed in the planing mill here and about 60 at Wallows.

Here in La Grande many key men of the company, the heads of the various departments, etc., will be retained on the payroll.

The company's camp at Maxville was closed some time ago, three men here being employed there in comparison with about 400 this time last year.

TO HEAD RED
CROSS DRIVEAnnual Roll Call Will Be
Held in La Grande in
the Near FutureORGANIZATION IS
BEING PERFECTEDMiss Jean Blanchard, National
Worker, Makes
the Necessary Arrange-
ments for Campaign.

Dr. Ray Murphy is to take the chairmanship for the Red Cross roll call in La Grande this year and he is at present perfecting an organization for the campaign and probably the active work of the membership solicitation will be started early next week, it is announced.

Miss Jean Blanchard, national Red Cross worker, has been here for the last few days making necessary arrangements and both she and Dr. Murphy state that no attempt will be made to solicit memberships as during the war period, but they hope to get at least 500 or 600 memberships at \$1 each.

Half of each dollar membership paid will remain in this community for local relief work, Dr. Murphy says.

The remainder will go for national Red Cross relief work.

"This will be the La Grande's contribution toward the American Red Cross relief work," Dr. Murphy said. "Extensive demands for service in disasters and emergencies and a desire on the part of the Red Cross to widen its activities in the fields of public health, life saving, first aid and similar enterprises, make necessary increased support from the people."

A gigantic task

"Just how gigantic the task of administering disasters has become is evidenced in the annual report of the Red Cross for the closing fiscal year. Relief was given in a total of 84 major and minor disasters in the United States and in 21 foreign disasters. Included in the list of domestic disasters were the Florida hurricane and the Mississippi valley

King Benjamin's
Regime Is Ended

Aged Leader of Religious
Cult Is Ordered Exiled
from the Colony

ST. JOSEPH, Mich., Nov. 10 (AP).—The rule of King Benjamin Purnell over the picturesque religious cult he founded in Benton Harbor a quarter of a century ago was ordered ended today.

Circuit Judge Louis S. Peck, of New Berry, entered an order in the state's dissolution suit decreeing that a receiver shall take over control of the "House of David" colony and that Purnell, whom the state alleged practiced fraud and immorality must go into exile from his followers. The court ruled he shall be banished from contact with those he is alleged to have misled by "complete and permanent removal from the colony grounds."

He may not associate with the girl colonists except under protective conditions. The court agreed with the state that the colony is a public nuisance because of fraud, immorality, perjury and other illegal acts.

Condition Of La Grande Girl Ill Of
Infantile Paralysis Is Unchanged

The condition of Olive June Cotner, 16, who is ill of infantile paralysis, was reported to be unchanged this morning by the attending physician. Her condition is serious, and it will probably be two or three more days before any changes will be noticeable, it was said.

Miss Cotner has been very ill of heart trouble for about six weeks, and her weakened condition adds to the seriousness of her condition. First symptoms of infantile paralysis were noticed day before yesterday when she developed a temperature.

The home of her aunt and uncle, Mr. and Mrs. Ben Cotner, is under strict quarantine and will remain so until all danger is over, Dr. A. L. Richardson, city health officer, said this morning.

A patriotic representation of veterans of three wars, as well as of fraternities and of civic organizations, will march in the ninth annual American Legion parade, which, led by the La Grande band, will officially open the Armistice day celebration here tomorrow.

The parade is to begin at 11 o'clock, commencing its line of march from the corner of Greenwood and Washington. Major Ralph Huron will be at the head of the procession, followed by the band, and in turn the national guards, Cars of G. A. R. and the W. R. C. will be next in line and will precede a delegation of Spanish war veterans. World war veterans and the American Legion auxiliary will be followed by boys scouts and the Salvation Army.

The American Legion drum corps will be next in line and will be followed by a peppy delegation of high school students and a truck transporting members of the second team football squad. Army trucks and tractors will make their appearance and car dealers displaying new models are also expected to participate in the parade, which is to disband at the Old Fellows' hall, where lunch is being served to all ex-service men and their wives. Harry Williams will have charge of the parade.

400 High School
Students Walkout

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Nov. 10 (AP).—Four hundred students of Cudahy high school went on strike today following the dismissal of Superintendent E. C. Seibert by the school board Wednesday night. Cudahy is a suburb. The students left the building and marched down the street shouting "We want Seibert."

BIG BREWERY
DISCOVERED
IN DETROITNearly a City Block Tak-
en Up by Elaborate
Giant Liquor PlantVALUE \$500,000 IS
OFFICERS' ESTIMATENo Arrests Made—Bars,
Dining Rooms and Dis-
tillery Deserted When
Agents Make Raid.

DETROIT, Nov. 10 (AP).—A substantial brewery, its intricate system of basements and passageways yielding beer and liquor making paraphernalia worth half a million dollars, has been found by federal prohibition agents a few steps from Detroit's main artery, Woodward avenue. So extensive was the plant that it occupied an entire city block of basements above that Woodward avenue. The plant, which was discovered when Vascetti and men agents arrived at an hour picked as most liable to catch the elusive brewer.

A fashionable night club at 32 Seven avenue, which was believed to be the headquarters and general offices of the underground plant, was deserted when Vascetti and men agents arrived at an hour picked as most liable to catch the elusive brewer.

200 tables set
In the dining room, where nearly 200 tables were set, many laden with steaming viands, there were evidences of a hasty exit by patrons. A few tables had been overturned. On racks in the check rooms were hung coats and hats left behind in the hurried departure.

On a 150-foot bar at the rear of the dining room were glasses containing beer or whisky which patrons had not taken time to consume. A few words of the impending raid were received. Behind the bar, the serving counter was stocked full.

Plant Elaborate

Most elaborate was the plant, which, most lavishly was the liquor making equipment. Included in contraband which the agents seized were: Several hundred barrels of beer; a large quantity of bottled beer; 11 cases of whiskey; 15,000-gallon vats of beer; three 25,000-gallon vats of beer; a ton and a half of filter paper pulp, used in purifying beer; three 20,000-gallon wooden whisky tanks, empty; a large ammonia refrigerating plant; a "cracker" machine used in filling kegs; five large automobile trucks. After more than an hour's investigation, agents found a cleverly concealed trapdoor of steel leading to a basement.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10 (AP).—Sheldon Clark, wealthy Chicago oil man and sportsman, was placed under arrest today after his refusal to testify in the grand jury investigation of the Ed-Stinchley jury-snellance scandal.

BASEBALL STAR
PLACED IN JAILChalmer Cissell, Ex-Port-
land Shortstop, Faces
Charges of Seduction

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 10 (AP).—Chalmer Cissell, riding from the army toward the big leagues at a speed with few precedents in baseball records, faced a criminal court detour today.

A felony indictment based on the story of a 26-year-old telephone operator in Des Moines, Iowa, led to his arrest at his home here last night. He is being held without bond for Iowa officers.

Last year Cissell was a soldier at Fort Des Moines. He stepped from khaki to the uniform of a Des Moines Western league ball player. His brilliance at shortstop caught the eye of scouts and he was sold to Portland of the Pacific coast league for \$10,000 and several players.

Almost at the same time last week that the Chicago White Sox announced they had purchased Cissell from Portland for \$125,000, a Des Moines grand jury returned an indictment against him, charging seduction.

The indictment was based on the telephone operator's story that Cissell had not kept a promise to marry her. She purchased a \$100,000 bond to get him to join her in Des Moines at the end of the baseball season. When he failed to arrive, she charged.

Two Suits Filed
In Bank Loss Case

PORTLAND, Nov. 10 (AP).—Charges that the Northwestern National bank, which went out of business last March following a run, was wrecked through carelessness, incompetency and unlawful acts of its board of directors were contained in two suits on file in federal court here.

One of the suits was filed today by Fred A. Ballin of Los Angeles, a stock holder, asking judgment of \$27,500. The other suit, filed secretly last Saturday by Charles A. Mueckhardt of Seattle, a stockholder, asked \$21,250 judgment. W. C. Bristol, Portland attorney, represents both plaintiffs.

Republican Meet
Set For Dec. 5

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10 (AP).—William M. Butler, chairman of the republican national committee, began preparations today for the meeting of the whole committee here, Dec. 5, when a convention city will be selected.

In addition to the regular meeting of the executive committee on Dec. 5, Mr. Butler plans to have all national committeemen as well as committeemen present for the December meeting. Besides selection of the convention city, however, no other plans have been put on the program.

Citizens' Party
In Philadelphia
Charges FraudAccuses Vane Machine of
Spending a Million Dol-
lars to Elect Harry
Mackey Mayor.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 10 (AP).—Leaders of the citizens' party, whose candidate for mayor was overwhelmingly defeated in Tuesday's election by the republican organization candidate, allege that the organization spent money recklessly in the municipal campaign as it did last year when William S. Vare was elected to the United States senate. It also alleged that intimidations and "assistance" were resorted to.

Asserting that the "attempted vindication" of Vare through the election of his campaign manager, Harry A. Mackey, to the mayoralty had cost the organization "approximately \$1,000,000." The citizens' party said the "org of expenditure" was greater in proportion than the \$3,000,000 spent in the state-wide campaign of 1926 which was the subject of a senatorial inquiry.

"We are advised," said a statement by the council, "that \$200 was allowed to most of the divisions to employ watchers and workers. Since there are over 1500 divisions this would mean approximately \$450,000 to begin with, apart from opposition watchers to keep away from the polls."

"Crushed the Polls"
While the citizens' party was limited in its expenditures to about \$150,000 for watchers the organization crashed the polls with as many as 15 and 20 watchers and workers, some of whom not only intimidated voters but doled out copious allowances in new \$10 notes and dispensed liquid refreshments lavishly.

"So numerous and grave are the charges coming into these headquarters that a meeting will be held to consider proposed course of procedure."

Mackey defeated J. Hampton Moore, citizen party candidate, more than 168,000 plurality.

Urges Reduction
In Theater Tax
On Stage Plays

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10 (AP).—Repeal of downward revision of the excise, or income taxes, including such things as levies on theater admissions, cigars and the like, was asked today at the house ways and means committee tax hearings.

Lakon Johnson of New York, representing the National Theatre association declared the ten per cent tax on theater tickets selling for 75 cents was a direct burden to the spoken drama.

Johnson argued that the spoken drama was an "intimate" form of amusement and because of this, unlike the motion pictures, must be confined to small theaters so the patrons could appreciate the expression of actors.

HARVEY SWART
IS ACCUSED ON
CHECK CHARGE

Harvey Swart was bound over to the grand jury yesterday on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses when he appeared before the justice of the peace and waived preliminary hearing. Bonds were set at \$200, which he was unable to furnish and as a result was committed to the county jail.

Swart was brought back to La Grande from Pendleton Tuesday by Sheriff Jesse Breeshare charged with having cashed a bad check here.

OGDEN, Utah, Nov. 10 (AP).—William Irvine, 39, of Baker City, Ore., was killed last night when he was struck by an automobile while crossing the road from his car to a soft drink stand. The sheriff declared the accident was unavoidable.

Kelley Attorneys
File Their BriefsRepublican Meet
Set For Dec. 5

SALEM, Nov. 10 (AP).—Attorneys for Ellsworth Kelley, under sentence to hang for his part in the state prison break of two years ago, yesterday filed in the supreme court their briefs in the appeal of the habeas corpus proceedings now pending.

A few days before Kelley and James Willos were to be executed the habeas corpus action was started. In the circuit court Judge McMahen held that Kelley was illegally held in the state prison at the time of the break and had a right to shoot his way out, but that all national committeemen as well as committeemen present for the December meeting. STATE MAKES
BEST BID TO
CONVICT GIRLLorena Trickey's Note Is
Read Before Colorful
Lakeview CrowdPROHIBITION AGENT
TELLS OF SPYINGRound-Up Star Near
Breakdown This Morn-
ing When Blood-Stained
Clothes Exhibited.

LAKEVIEW, Ore., Nov. 10 (AP).—With a colorful crowd hardly breathing from tense excitement, the state this morning made its strongest bid for the conviction of the pale faced and slim Lorena Trickey, round-up star, charged with murdering J. P. Harris, her common-law husband, on a lone road just on the outskirts of Lakeview.

R. M. Bennett, state prohibition officer, the state's star and so-called "surprise witness" read a note which Lorena had handed to him the day after she killed "Slim." She instructed Bennett to give it to Hob Brown, held in jail at that time as a suspect. Bennett's reading of the note was interrupted last night by adjournment of court.

The Note
"Bob," the note read, "you know who did it. He was a small, dark complexioned man, wearing a dark sweater and cap. You saw him in the barn about 6 p. m. Come clean Bob, and tell who did it. I will think more of you. It will clear both you and me. It's hard enough to be heartbroken without being suspected of killing 'Slim.'"

"Signed,
Lorena."
District Attorney Combes on direct examination indicated that the state regarded the note as proof positive of Lorena's guilt of cold-blooded and premeditated murder, that it showed she was trying to throw the suspicion on another man who "was innocent of the crime in order to clear herself. It is the 'dark complexioned man' was not revealed.

Bennett gave further telling testimony.

Spied on Lorena
He told of spying on Lorena on the night of Sept. 2, several hours after she had stabbed Harris to death.

Peeking through a hole in the window-curtain of her rooming house he saw Lorena sitting in a room before a stove, her head resting on her hands, her face showing no emotion. With her in the room was Charles. Bennett, a race horse man and rancher, and Mrs. Matthews, her landlady.

Bennett strode around to the front door, was admitted. When he entered Lorena's room she was sobbing.

Leaving the room and returning to his peephole, Bennett said Lorena was again cold and unemotional—not a sign of a tear. Again he returned to her room on a pretense and again she suddenly broke into tears.

The state prohibition officer told the experiment a third time with this same result, he said. Each of the three times he would enter the room Lorena would be sobbing as if her heart would break. Each time he looked through the window curtain, her face was stolid with not a sign of a tear, he testified.

Bennett's testimony supported by that of Pat McCarty yesterday constitutes the state case. McCarty, Lake county's champion broncho-buster, told of harsh words between Lorena and "Slim" Harris on the day of the killing.

"Any way," he quoted Slim as saying, "I'm going to leave you after this round-up."
"If you do," McCarty quoted Lorena, "I'll kill you."

Lorena Near Breakdown
Lorena was on the verge of a breakdown this morning when District Attorney Combes unwrapped a bundle containing the blood-stained coat and shirt of "Slim" Harris.

"Can you," he asked Sheriff Friday, on the stand, "identify these garments?"

As he asked the question, the garments were held directly in front of Miss Trickey. Tears rolled.
