Stars of Oregon and Aggie Elevens

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Nov. 10 (Special)—Another page of state grid history will be written on the books late Friday afternoon when the football teams of the University of Oregon and Oregon Agricultural college meet on Hayward field here in the 32nd annual fray.

Both teams have been resting the past two weeks. Neither eleven has started the world by spectacular playing to date, and this will go into the Armistice fray on even terms.

The strength of the two aggregations is about equal; with fight always reigning paramount. In previous years, however, it has meant nothing and time after time when the Webfoots were given no chance to win they turned the tables and had upset the Aggie titular hopes. On other occasions the Aggies unexpectedly have fought to victory.

This season the Beavermen are slight favorites, except in Eugene where football followers believe Captain John J. McEwan, head coach, has finally brought his team around. There is a fighting spirit on the Webfoot team that may surprise the Aggies Friday, McEwan said.

The seven-year jinx which the Aggies claim over Oregon still remains this fall. Heretofore, in 1907 and 1917, ten year intervals, the Aggies were victorious and believe this jinx will hold forth this fall in 1927. However the jinx had been broken last year when the Aggies drew two victories in a row in 1925 and 1926.

Michigan-Navy, Chicago-Illinois Games Saturday

CHICAGO, Nov. 10 (AP)—Michigan's traditional maize and blue will be reinforced with flames boyant orange when its football team attempts to sink the Navy at Ann Arbor Saturday.

Last year the Middles turned tables on the expanding Wolverines at Annapolis 10 to 0 and the defeat was partially blamed on the similarity of uniforms, which caused considerable confusion. But Saturday Michigan players will wear orange painted helmets to distinguish who's who.

The "big" game of the Big Ten will be played at Champaign with Illinois defending a clean record against Chicago, lusty for victory after a pair of conference defeats.

Chicago expects to have full strength available. The casualties of the Michigan game having recovered from injuries which were found not as serious as at first indicated.

Ken Rose, captain and line mauler, will oppose Bob Reisch, Illinois' all-conference center.

BIG GAMES LOOM IN EAST NOV. 12

Job of Filling Caldwell's Shoes Worries Yale—U. of P. Plays Huskers

NEW YORK, Nov. 10 (AP)—The job of filling Bruce Caldwell's mid-overcast football shoes and the big blue jersey numbered 48 hurried Ted Jones today in his task of preparing Yale for the 52nd meeting with Princeton at New Haven Saturday.

Two candidates stood out in the squad—John Govey, undoubtedly of the disqualified era all season, and Bill Hammeley, crack kicker and passing threat.

For the most part, Jones seeks a man to leave the forward passes that have panned consistently all season and to handle the defense by ability to run, pass or kick from punt formation.

Princeton Ready Princeton with its undefeated and united eleven intact but for a squabbling about on ends, finished heavy work yesterday. Princeton will move into New Haven tomorrow for a final practice in the bowl.

Army will leave for New York tomorrow and the intercollegiate game with Notre Dame, a classic of the east, called only by the meeting of Princeton and Yale.

Putting two subs through their paces last year in practice at the famous passing combination of Michigan—Benny Gosterman and Benny Friedman—worked so well for a 19 to 9 victory that Navy is trying the same plan this year.

Only this time the passing duo are labeled Gosterman and Gilbert, one of the attack the Middles will face at Ann Arbor Saturday.

Pittsburg, as yet undefeated this season, is stepping into play in preparation for the smooth running attack of Nebraska.

Dartmouth went through the final hard work out for Cornell and snow hurrles while the Ithaca drilled until dusk to round out a veteran eleven from a squad hard hit by injuries.
