

Start Preparing For 1928 Chicken Flock Is Advice

Preparing for next spring's chicks begins with care of breeders. They should be made to molt 30 days before hatching eggs are wanted. Cut off all egg mash suddenly. If lights are used, discontinue them at once. Keep this up for a week. If they are not then in a molt, stint them in water for a day.

When they are well into a molt and have stopped laying, return to the regular egg mash, advises W. D. Buchanan, extension specialist in poultry at the State College of Washington. They need protein for rapid feather building. Add 5 pounds of linseed oil meal to each 100 pounds of egg mash. Continue until feathers are fully grown.

As soon as the breeders are well feathered out, reduce the animal protein to one-half of the amount used in the regular laying ration. If alfalfa meal has not been used, add 10 pounds of a good grade to each 100 pounds of mash. Alfalfa that is pale in color and has 20 to 40 per cent fiber is not good for chickens.

If milk is abundant, it is not necessary to feed breeders any mash after they are fully feathered and before eggs are wanted. A grain ration with 5 quarts of sour skim milk or 3 pounds of semi-solid milk daily for each 100 birds, will keep them in excellent condition. When eggs are wanted, continue the milk and give a laying on breeders' mash, low in animal protein.

Grand Jury In Baker Returns Six Indictments

BAKER, Ore., Nov. 9.—The Baker county grand jury, after being in session for seven days, Monday night returned one not true bill and eight true bills, including four secret indictments.

Fred Tate was indicted on a charge of assault with intent to kill, in connection with the stabbing on August 25 of Lillian Jones, with whom he is said to have lived. The woman was stabbed twice. Tate admits stabbing the woman, but claims he struck her in self defense after she had drawn a pistol.

John Bowers, who is alleged to have beaten Albert Lenta on August 2 so severely that the victim died two weeks later, is held on a charge of manslaughter.

Mrs. Mattie Morgan was indicted on a charge of larceny of stealing cattle, and Ed Miller on a count of possessing intoxicating liquor. The grand jury also recommended that the people of the county vote a tax not to exceed one mill to raise funds with which to establish a new poor farm on producing ground, where the farm could be made as nearly self-sustaining as possible.

Police Protection For Chorus Girls

PARIS (AP)—A bureau for the "protection of chorus girls" has been created by Prefect of Police Chippie. M. Prielet, Police Commissioner for the Montmartre district, heads the bureau.

This bureau is destined not to protect chorus girls from the pitfalls and bright lights of the gay city but to save their lives and limbs from defective drop curtains and faulty mechanical stage devices.

The death of a chorus girl killed at the Folies Bergeres when an unprotected live wire touched her bare leg and injuries suffered by three girls at the Palace when a drop curtain struck them violently, are responsible for the innovation.

Henceforth a special police officer will conduct a thorough test of all the material in music halls before every performance.
