"Lone Eagle" At Star Today And Friday

"The Lone Eagle" the Universal Jewel photoplay of aviation during the late world war, opened at the Star theater this afternoon for a two day run.

The picture depicts just enough of the horrors of war—as seen and experienced from the air—to demonstrate its utility. It does not show an endless procession of soldiers marching to the front nor does it show mud-enraged doughboys hysterically waving flags as they go over the top. In other words, it is a true version of the war. Ask an ex-serviceman, if by his meaning is not clear.

Raymond Keane portrays the American youth attached to a veteran unit of the British Flying Corps. His portrayal is excellent and he is to be reckoned with as one of the coming outstanding stars of the screen. Barbara Kent, 1927 Baby Star, is delightful as his little French sweetheart.

The scenes in which the two of them appear leave nothing to be desired. Jack Pennick, Nigel Harrie, Don Stuart and the balance of the capable cast give sterling performances.

The story was written by Lieutenant Ralph Blanchard of the United States air service and was published under the title, "Winged Victory." The screen adaptation was made by John G. Myers.

Emory Johnson, the director, deserves credit for the deft way in which he handles several intricate situations as well as the smooth way in which the entire film unfolds.

Magruder's Mirth

Famous "Ben Hur" Picture Coming To Arcade

"Ben-Hur," a Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer production made in Italy and in California, by special arrangement with A. L. Erlanger, Charles B. Dillingham and F. Ziegfeld Jr., will have its premiere here at the Arcade theater next Monday, opening a special engagement of that date.

The picture was directed by Fred Niblo, and the history of its three years in work is a real-life odyssey of enterprise and adventure, culminating with the completion of the Antioch circus and race course and the filming of the great chariot race twist Messala and Ben-Hur.

General Lew Wallace wrote "Ben-Hur" half a century ago (1875-80), and its success as a novel was followed in 1929 by its dramatization. The stage spectacle held the boards for 22 seasons, in which it became the most widely known stage offering in America.

In picturing the work Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer has enjoyed the immense advantage of the movies of a story laid in outdoor scenes and characterized by the splendor and pomp of Graeco-Roman milieu in the time of Christ. Among the greater scenes on which the New Art has lavished its resources are those of the Wise Men and the Star of Bethlehem, Jerusalem under Roman occupation, the sea battle twist Greeks and Romans, the life in Antioch and the chariot race, the hero's assembling of his Galilean legions, the finding of his mother and sister in the Vale of Hinnom, and the miraculous healing wrought by the living power. These scenes are knit together by a story of love and revenge, to which the romance of Ben-Hur and Esther, the intrigues of Messala and the wives of Irs, lend engrossing interest. The latest nonsense opera of this indelible pair, "Now We're in the Air," is opening a three day engagement at the Arcade theater today. Beery and Hatton exceed anything they have ever done before for Paramount.

They are shown as a couple of luck savants, who become such by wandering into a propeller testing room where six propellers are roaring at once and having their Scotch highlander costumes blown off them. Some one tosses them a pair of flying suits and they are off.

Mistaken identity dominates the theme. It does not end with the comedians being mistaken for fliers, but Louise Brooks, the charming and beautiful leading woman, figures in the mistakes. 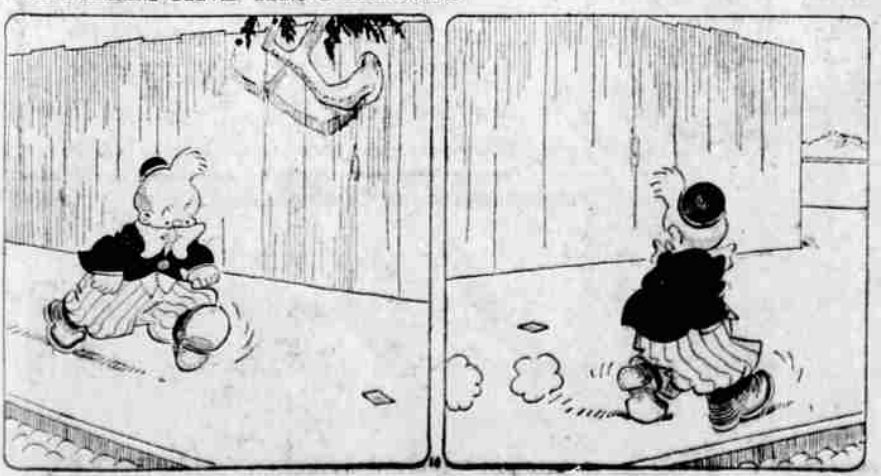
