The state will complete its case by early afternoon. A night session will be held tonight and Loren's will probably be on the stand most of the evening telling her story to the jury.

That Harris had tried to kill Loren two months previous to his death, that he at one time had thrown her through a window and that on several occasions he had threatened to kill her was the testimony—unshaken on cross examination—of defense witnesses this afternoon.

U. S. Steel Leads Advance In Wall Street Trading

NEW YORK, Nov. 10 (AP)—The unexpected large increase in the price of U. S. Steel stock today led the advance in the price of the stock of the company.

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Higher Price Is Predicted For Purebred Stock

CHICAGO (AP)—Increase in the price of purebred stock this fall and winter are inevitable, in the opinion of F. W. Harding, general executive of the American Short-horn Breeders' association.

"Over a period of 25 years the price of breeding stock of good quality has been an average three times the price of a steer," said Mr. Harding.

"This should mean \$100 each for pure-bred, and they won't do that by quite a bit. In other words, they are too low, and it is to be expected that the spread will be gradually narrowed in the near future."

Harding has just returned from a trip abroad. He purchased 25 milking Shorthorns from 13 leading British herds. He found prices of steers in this country about the same as in England, but it costs the English farmer much more to feed.

He points out that feeding tests conducted at Iowa State College over a period of ten months, revealed the comparative costs in America, with low-priced feeds, of handling a group of 200-pound two-year-old steers, another group of 200-pound yearlings and a third lot of 25-pound calves.

Given shelled corn, linseed meal, alfalfa and block salt, the two-year-olds made bigger gains but more expensive ones in the four months before they were sold. The feed cost per 100 pounds was almost as much in finishing the yearlings over seven months as in the case of the two-year-olds. The feed cost for the calves mounted steadily through their ten-month test, but never reached that of the other classes.

The feedstuffs used were selected as best suited for general feeding purposes both from cost and nutritive standards.
