Bridge Pointers

The pointer for today is: Players should be familiar with the exceptions to the denial rule. Yesterday's article gave five hands supposed to be held by North, South (Dealer) having bid one Spade and West having passed, the question in each was what North should declare.

1. Sp.: x-x-x. Hl.: Ace-King-Jack-x-x. Dl.: x. Cl.: Ace-Jack-x-x. Pass. To bid two Hearts is tempting with that strength; but the suit has not the length to justify a seeming denial of normal support for South's Spades. South might bid two Spades if he North had denied them, and yet the combined hands might have a game with Spades and not with Hearts. The short Diamonds make it probable that North will be forced to ruff that suit early; and it is better to ruff from Dummy than from the Closed Hand. After once passing, North should bid Hearts if either adversary overcall and South do not rebid Spades.

2. Sp.: x-x-x-x. Hl.: Ace-King-Jack-x-x-x. Dl.: x. Cl.: Ace-Jack-x-x. Pass. Although the Heart suit is identical with No. 2, the fourth Spade (more than normal support) makes denying most inadvisable. Even if South have only four Spades, the hand must work satisfactorily with that suit the trump.

3. Sp.: x-x-x-x. Hl.: Ace-King-Jack-x-x. Dl.: None. Cl.: Ace-Jack-x-x. Pass. Although the Heart suit is identical with No. 2, the fourth Spade (more than normal support) makes denying most inadvisable. Even if South have only four Spades, the hand must work satisfactorily with that suit the trump.

4. Sp.: x-x-x-x. Hl.: Ace-King-Jack-x-x. Dl.: x-x. Cl.: Ace-Jack-x-x. Pass. King and one is normal support. The weak Diamonds should preclude any thought of No Trump, and a shift to a four-card Heart suit would be most unwise; so would overcalling with the five-card Club suit, as that not only would deny Spades but also would announce "Nothing but Clubs here."

5. Sp.: King-x. Hl.: Ace-King-Jack-x-x.

Menus

By Sister Mary BIRKAPASP—Grapefruit, cereal, cream, baked sausage, cream of potatoes, whole wheat muffins, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Creamed oysters on toast, celery and apple salad, molasses cookies, milk, tea.

DINNER—Roast shoulder of lamb, boiled potatoes in parsley butter, mashed turnips, head lettuce with Russian dressing, peach fritters with peach syrup, milk, coffee.

Nippy fall mornings sound the first call for sausage. However, some persons find that they can't take care of the hearty meat in the morning but do enjoy a dinner of sausage with mashed potatoes, apple sauce, whole wheat and perhaps buckwheat cakes and syrup. If this is the case, substitute broiled lamb chops for breakfast and serve the sausage for dinner.

Peach Fritters—Three-fourths cup flour, 1 tablespoon sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup milk, 2 tablespoons melted butter, 1 egg white, 1 cup dried canned peaches.

Mix and sift flour, sugar and salt. Add water slowly, stirring to keep a smooth batter. Beat in peaches and butter. Add peaches drained from their juice and fold in whites of eggs beaten until stiff and dry. Drop from tip of spoon into deep hot fat and cook five minutes. The fat should register about 375 degrees Fahrenheit or an inch cube of bread from the soft part of the loaf should brown in forty seconds. Drain fritters on brown paper and roll in powdered sugar. Serve with the following sauce:

Peach Sauce—Three-fourths cup sugar, 1 tablespoon flour, 1 cup peach juice, 1 tablespoon orange juice, 1 teaspoon grated rind, 1 egg yolk, few grains salt.

Mix sugar and flour. Add peach juice, salt and grated rind and stir until smooth. Cook ten minutes, stirring constantly. Beat egg yolk slightly with orange juice and stir into sauce. Cook one minute and serve.
