Active Trading Marks Portland Wholesale Mart

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 12 (AP)—Active trading at prices generally steady with Thursday's quotations marked the Portland wholesale market for seasonable fresh fruits and vegetables today.

The potato market continued quiet with prices ranging generally unchanged. No. 1 Oregon Netted Gems were quoted from \$1.65 to \$1.80 per sack, according to percent grade, and combination grades could be had down to \$1.25 per sack.

Butter and egg markets were steady and demand active for light supplies of fresh receipts quoted at exchange prices unchanged from Thursday.

Country dressed meats and poultry also were quotably steady in early transactions, with receipts in practically all lines sufficient for demand.

CHICAGO, Nov. 12 (AP)—Opening 1 1/2 to 2 1/2c higher, wheat held near to initial figures. Corn started 1 1/2 to 3c lower and showed little power to rally. Oats were easier and provisions tended upward. Wheat closed firm, 2 to 2 1/2c net higher; corn 2 1/2 to 2 3/4c off; oats 1/4 to 1/2c down, and provisions unchanged to 50c up.

Closing Is Firm As Week Ends In Stock Exchange

NEW YORK, Nov. 12 (AP)—Representative stocks were in big demand at rising prices during the first hour of today's market. U. S. Steel touched 129 1/2; General Motors 132 1/2; International Harvester 241 and Southern Railway 141 1/2, all the best levels since the current recovery began.

International Harvester, which had a sensational jump of 12 points yesterday, forged ahead further before it met sufficient stock to cause a reaction of about five points. Another high priced share, Dupont, which is expected to pass along to shareholders the extra dividend, received from General Motors, also showed conspicuous strength.

Prices came down from the high levels in the second hour when the usual weekend profit taking began to make an impression on the market's trend. The closing was firm. Total sales approximated 900,000 shares.

Injunction Granted In Cleveland Case

CLEVELAND, Nov. 12 (AP)—A temporary injunction barring the board of elections from certifying the results of Tuesday's vote on the proposed city charter amendment sponsored by former Governor Harry L. Davis, was granted today by Judge Frederick P. Walthers in common pleas court.

The injunction marked the first step in Davis' announced plan to obtain a new election on the ground that the vote Tuesday was fraudulent.

The Davis amendment would have declared the city manager's office vacant Monday with Carl F. Shuler, city law director, serving as acting mayor until Jan. 17, when a new mayor, named at a special election, would take charge of the city government.

Judge Walthers granted the injunction without notice to the defendants and followed that later by issuing a second temporary injunction restraining the election board from interfering with or discussing the ballot.

FAIL PROVES FATAL

Niklason lost his balance while hopping toward his crutches which were against the wall near the window.

Hundreds of persons from various parts of Nevada, with his staff of three states were present. A and many other notables attended.

NOTICE OF SCHOOL ELECTION TO INCREASE TAX MORE THAN SIX PERCENT OVER THAT OF PREVIOUS YEARS.

Notice is hereby given to the legal voters of School District No. 1, of Union County, State of Oregon, that an election will be held in said district on Saturday, the 3rd day of December, 1927, between the hours of two o'clock and seven o'clock in the afternoon of said day, to vote on the question of increasing the amount of the tax levied in said district for the year 1927-1928 by more than six percent over the amount of such levy for the year immediately preceding.

It is necessary to raise this additional amount by special election for the following reasons: Retirement of \$15,000.00 on principal of outstanding bond issue, instead of \$10,000.00, amount retired annually in two preceding years, increases the amount over the six percent increase allowed, in the sum of \$2,977.26. The amount to be raised by district tax is \$121,664.26. School attendance has increased to limit of capacity of present school buildings, and construction of new building or buildings, through new bond issue, is imminent; therefore it is necessary that future bonding capacity of school district be enlarged by reduction of present bonded indebtedness as much as reasonably may be done.

The polling places for said election will be at the Central School Building on Fourth Street and the Greenwood School Building on Greenwood Street. Legal voters residing south of the O.-W. R. R. & N. main line will vote at the Central School Building, and legal voters residing North of said railroad will vote at the Greenwood School Building. A qualified voter at this election is any citizen of the state, male or female, who is over twenty-one years of age, and has resided in the district thirty days immediately preceding the election, and has property in the district, as shown by the 1926 Union County assessment, or produces evidence that he or she has stock, shares or ownership in any corporation, firm or co-partnership which has property in the district, as shown by the 1926 county assessments. Registration is not necessary.
