News of the Churches

Church Programs In City Sunday Will Be Varied

Special Musical Numbers Besides Addresses Will Be Heard at Presbyterian Church.

Tomorrow's church programs are varied and full of interest. One of the most interesting will take place at the First Presbyterian church, several special musical numbers having been arranged for in addition to the sermons in the morning and evening.

In the morning the Rev. J. George Waiz, pastor of the church, will speak on the subject "One Hundred and Twenty-five Years of History of National Missions in the Presbyterian Church." This home mission survey discloses the changed conditions confronting the church in urban and rural life from year to year, and the extent to which the church has failed to function in each and why. It also offers a plan and program of constructive advance to remedy the defects and to meet the challenges of a changing social order," the Rev. Mr. Waiz declares.

In his address Mr. Waiz will also include something of the 50 years work of the Women's Missionary organization of the Presbyterian church, and the 50 years of mission work in Alaska.

Mrs. Ray Fuller will sing a solo during the morning service, "A Song of Thanksgiving" by Aliffen. Mrs. Harley Richardson will render on the pipe organ "Abresque" by Wragell, as an offertory, and will play two others numbers, to be selected.

In the evening Miss Edris Maguire will play two special organ numbers, "Chant Sans Parole" by E. Tachakowsky, and "Serenade" by Wragell. The pastor will speak on the subject "In The Face of Jesus." The evening service are being appreciated by many, the Rev. Mr. Waiz reports. Others will be welcome and would not doubt profit by them, he says.

Episcopal Church

The Rev. Oliver Riley, rector of St. Peter's Episcopal church, will speak on the subject "Herodias" Sunday morning at 11 o'clock at the church at 11 o'clock. This will be preceded by Holy Eucharist at 8 o'clock and church school at 9:45.

"Christian Pneumatology" will be the subject of the evening services, which begins at 7:30 o'clock. The Wayfarer's Guild will meet at 6 o'clock.

Mrs. H. L. Putnam will preach both morning and evening at the Central Christian church in the absence of the Rev. R. L. Putnam, who is conducting evangelistic meetings in the Christian church at Baker, in the morning Mrs. Putnam's subject will be "Come Receive—Go Give." The Bible school will meet at 9:45 o'clock in the morning and the junior, intermediate and senior Christian Endeavor societies will meet at 6:30 o'clock.

Eager Admirers Nearly Mob the Prince Of Wales

LONDON, Nov. 12 (AP)—A crowd of eager admirers, who nearly mobbed him, forced the Prince of Wales to seek refuge in Scotland Yard after an Armistice day celebration at the Cenotaph. When the prince was inside the gates and the crowd tried to rush through the gates and the prince had to pass through the yard to the Victoria embankment to reach his car.

The prince and Winston Churchill, chancellor of the exchequer, attended a service at the Cenotaph. As the prince turned to leave there was a wild roar of cheering and shouts of "Wales."

Police quickly closed around the prince. A squad of mounted men fought their way through the shouting mob. They formed a lane through which the prince with difficulty reached Scotland Yard. The great gates of the yard closed behind him. The prince noticed his companions were still outside and asked that the gates be reopened to admit them.

The gate swung open, the crowd surged forward again. The pressure of these struggling thousands was so great that they almost conquered the police.

The demonstrators were wildly singing "For He's a Jolly Good Fellow." The police finally conquered the crowd and shut the gates.

WHEAT ESTIMATE IN OREGON SAME AS ON OCTOBER 1

first official estimate shows a reduction to about 80 per cent of last year.

Potatoes

Owing to the lateness of killing frosts in most of the principal growing sections of the state, maturity of the late crop has been delayed, and much digging remains to be done. Estimates of yield per acre range from 500 bushels per acre on a few selected acres down to 40 to 50 bushels on some of the dried lands. The state average as reported by correspondents is 113 bushels per acre. The acreage is estimated at 52,000 hence the production is estimated at 6,136,000 bushels. Last year's estimate was 4,500,000 bushels, and the five year average is 4,345,000 bushels.

Quality of the Oregon crop is placed at 85 per cent of normal, compared with the 10 year average of 88 per cent. Owing to the immaturity of the crop and the presence of considerable late blight, fears are expressed by numerous growers that keeping quality will prove below average. The United States potato crop is now forecast at 400,395,000 bushels, which compares with 360,350,000 bushels last year, and the five year average of 394,162,000 bushels.

Apples

The Oregon total apple crop is forecast at 4,547,000 bushels and the commercial production at 3,235,000 boxes. Demand and price have been quite satisfactory, particularly when compared with last year. But warm rains reported much more numerous than usual, and considerable difficulty has been experienced in washing operations for the removal of spray residue.

The United States apple crop showed a further decline during October, and is now forecast at 119,333,000 bushels compared with 123,115,000 bushels last month, and 244,460,000 bushels a year ago. The commercial crop is estimated at 24,000,000 barrels (equivalent to 24,330,000 bushels) compared with 24,330,000 barrels a month ago, and 39,441,000 barrels a year ago.

STOWAWAY DIES

PORTLAND, Nov. 12 (AP)—The body of a stowaway, believed to be Gus Schiffman, was turned over to the county coroner today on the arrival of the steamer Nubema from San Francisco. Members of the crew found Schiffman Thursday in one of the steamer's holds, and he was given food. Next day he died. Dr. Earl Smith, county coroner said death was due to natural causes, probably lack of food.

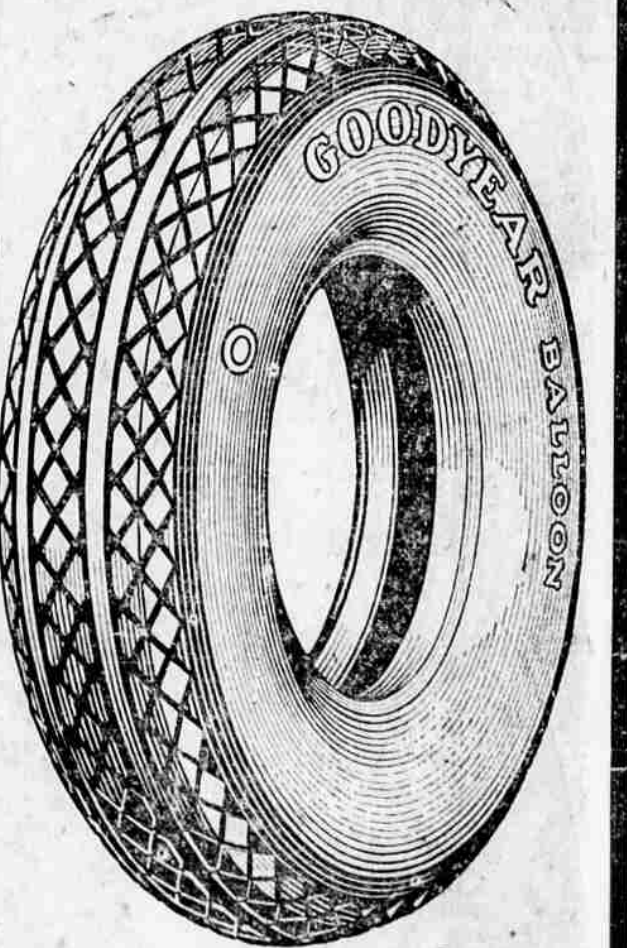
