87 NAMES ON
PETITION ARE
HELD 'LEGAL'Nearly Half of Persons
Who Asked W. C. Crews'
Removal Not VotersONLY 82 SIGNERS
ARE TAXPAYERSA. T. Hill, President of
Commission, Has Not
Yet Announced Investi-
gating Committee.

The petition filed last Wednesday asking for the removal of City Manager W. C. Crews because of "extravagance and inefficiency" was checked this morning at the city house and it was found that only 87 of the 179 names signed can legally remain on the paper.

The law, as explained by City Attorney George T. Cochran, is that in a petition of this kind the signers must be a legal voter. A total of 87 registered voters signed the petition.

87 Legal Signers

Only 82 of the signers are taxpayers and a total of 60 were neither taxpayers nor registered voters. This leaves the petition carrying only 87 legal signers instead of 179.

A. T. Hill, president of the city commission, has not yet announced his selection of five committees to investigate the charges made against Mr. Crews.

Mr. Crews Returns

The petition was presented to the city last Wednesday afternoon and was read at the city commission meeting that evening. Mr. Crews was not present, as he had gone to Eugene on a visit.

He returned to La Grande last night. In reference to the petition filed against him, Mr. Crews remarked to an Observer reporter that he had been told when he was here so that he could have answered it at the time. Mr. Crews welcomed an investigation of his conduct of his office, he says.

AROUND \$1500

A Merchandising ServiceSchool Budget
Vote Is Set For
Saturday, Dec. 3

Hearing Held Here Saturday Afternoon at Which Estimates Were Adopted by Board.

The 1927-1928 school budget, amounting to \$174,652, a total of \$121,652.26 of which is to be raised by district tax, was adopted by the La Grande board of education Saturday afternoon, when a hearing on the proposed budget was held at the central school building.

The budget was read by P. A. Spill, chairman of the board, after which it was adopted, and a special school election was ordered for Saturday, Dec. 3, from 2 until 7 o'clock at the Central and Greenwood school buildings.

The amount of the budget is \$2977.26 more than the increase allowed under the six per cent constitutional amendment, which makes it necessary that a special election be held for the voters to adopt the budget. The retirement of \$15,000 on principal of outstanding bond issue instead of \$10,000 makes the increase necessary.

The same judges and clerks who acted during the school election in June will assist in the special election.

Mr. Anderson Is
Called Beyond;
Burial Tuesday

Funeral services for Andrew S. Anderson, who died here Saturday at 6 p. m., will be held tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Presbyterian church. It is announced this morning. The Rev. J. George Wicks will officiate. Burial will be in the Masonic cemetery, under the direction of the Hunter and Bohnekamp mortuary.

Andrew Sven Anderson was born June 14, 1857 in Sweden where he resided until early manhood. Forty-three years ago he came to the United States, residing in Illinois and Colorado until he settled in La Grande 35 years ago.

On May 20, 1892 he was married to Miss Anna Anderson and to this union was born one daughter, Hulda, and one son, Charles, who died in infancy. For nearly 34 years Mr. Anderson has been an employee of the Union Pacific System, most of these years being employed as a helper and blacksmith in the local shops.

He was a member of the local order of the Woodmen of the World and an active member of the local Presbyterian church where for 25 years he held the office of ruling elder.

Mr. Anderson leaves besides his devoted widow and daughter, one sister, Mrs. Anna Hartle, of Portland, Ore.; one brother, Neth Anderson, of Sweden, two cousins, Albert Greene and Mrs. Ellis Pratt, of Princeton, Ill., and other near relatives.

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GRAND JURY
HEARS STORY
OF KILLINGMartin "Ike" Horrell, of
Enterprise, Not Placed
Under ArrestTHREE PERSONS
PRESENT AT TIMESheriff A. B. Miller De-
clares the Slaying Was a
Plain Case of Self De-
fense.

ENTERPRISE, Ore., Nov. 14 (Special).—Martin "Ike" Horrell, 30, who is alleged to have fatally shot his father, John S. Horrell, 55, at their ranch home about 5:30 o'clock Friday evening, arrived here yesterday and is to appear before the grand jury here today.

Sheriff A. B. Miller declared that the case was a plain one of self defense and was advised by the district attorney not to arrest the younger Horrell.

There were three eye witnesses to the crime, officers relate, and they each tell the same story of the affair.

Eye Witnesses' Story

The shooting, as described by the eye witnesses, Mr. and Mrs. Hoffman and Mrs. Horrell, occurred as follows:

"There had been a bitter quarrel of long standing between the father and son, it is said. The climax came Friday evening when the men went to the barn to do the evening chores."

There were two cows to milk and each man took a cow. The son, however, only brought one pail. This infuriated the older man because the son had not brought two pails and he immediately began beating him with the butt end of his revolver, which he is said to have constantly carried. Two La Grande
Men in Jail in
Pendleton, Ore.

PENDLETON, Ore., Nov. 14 (AP).—John L. Snodgrass and C. E. Kingsley, both of La Grande, are being held in the Umatilla county jail on charges of transportation and possession of liquor in lieu of bail bonds set at \$250 and \$500 respectively by Justice Berkeley.

They were arrested near Emigrant Springs by Union county officers late Thursday and turned over to Sheriff Cookingham. They were arraigned in justice court Saturday.

Snodgrass and Kingsley were arrested Thursday afternoon by Sheriff Jesse Hreshers, Deputy H. A. Klinghammer and Officer Dick Robertson, who turned them over to Sheriff Cookingham. Mr. Klinghammer and Mr. Robertson went to Pendleton Saturday for the arraignment in the Pendleton justice court.

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
