INFANTILE PARALYSIS
IS ON INCREASE

Infantile paralysis has been on the increase this year. From July 1 to Oct. 1 there were 4,570 cases in the United States as compared with 1,228 cases for the corresponding period of last year, according to statistics compiled by the United States public health service.

Poliomyelitis is the correct name for the disease. J. P. Leake, surgeon of the United States public health service, who made an extensive study of poliomyelitis, has written the following concerning the diagnosis of the disease:

"Acute poliomyelitis sometimes, but not usually results in paralysis. The ability to diagnose the disease in the absence of paralysis has only comparatively recently come to us, although Caverly of Vermont, in 1894, and Wickman of Sweden, in 1907, described such cases. If paralysis occurs, it is usually after the disease itself is well on its way, so that diagnosis of the non-paralytic stages and the non-paralytic cases is doubly important for the protection of contacts and for the institution of measures of treatment. Though pre-eminently a disease of children, it is by no means rare in adults, and the less urban the community the higher the average age of those affected. Thus for two reasons the frequently used term 'infantile paralysis' is hardly a correct name for the disease."

"Draper and Haynes have emphasized two stages in the progress of the disease—first, that of general, or systemic, symptoms, and second, that of invasion of the central nervous system, which frequently occurs between these two stages. But that is not the whole story; the disease is very commonly one of remissions at every stage. Though we cannot speak with such assurance about the systematic stage, it is probable that here, also, as is repeatedly observed in the
