Wheat Firm And More Than Cent Higher at Close

CHICAGO, Nov. 15 (AP)—Opening at 1 1/2 to 1 3/4c higher, wheat held near to the initial range. Corn and oats also were firmer, corn starting 1/4 to 1/2c up and subsequently showing additional gains. Provisions were easy.

Wheat closed firm, 1 1/2 to 1 3/4c net higher; corn 2 1/2 to 3 1/2c up, oats 1/4 to 1 1/2c advance and provisions varying from 5c decline to a rise of 2 1/2c.

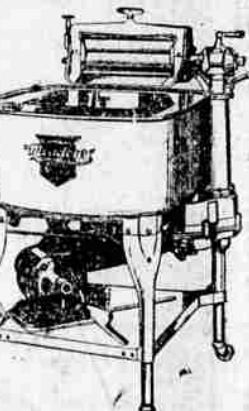
