EX-GOVERNOR DECLINES TO SEEK OFFICE

believe that the principle of the protective tariff is right. The object being to enable the manufacturer of protected goods to sell at home for more money than he asks for the same goods when sold abroad. If this is granted, then those who produce a surplus of agricultural products, have an equal right to have laws enacted that will enable the producer of surplus crops to receive a higher price in the home market than they do for the surplus which is exported.

"How perfectly his business controls the state of Oregon is well illustrated by two commissions recently appointed, one by the governor, to fix the Washington, D. C., lobby, for the repeal of the federal inheritance tax. The plan of the ultra rich, who seek the repeal of this tax, is to abolish all inheritance taxes, both federal and state. When the federal tax is repealed, then active propaganda will be made threatening that the rich will leave the state having this tax, and establish their residences in the states having no inheritance tax, like Florida and Nevada, thereby freeing them from the responsibility of returning to the public at death, a small portion of their accumulations, generally due to favorable legislation. This means to the property owners of Oregon an additional half million dollars taxes annually.

Pierce's Opinion

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Large Buck Deer Charges Rancher

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Nov. 16 (AP)—A large buck mule deer charged into a farmer's back yard and twice attacked the peaceful rancher was contained in a wire received here yesterday by Stanley G. Jewett, head of the biological survey for Oregon. The report was made by Game Warden L. B. Hazeltine.

The farmer, living seven miles north of Burns, was in his back yard about dusk when suddenly a big buck appeared out of the forest. Jewett said, "The man ran for cover, the deer pursuing. The farmer's dog came to the rescue and drove back the animal. The rancher made a dash for his house and the deer attacked again. Grading a run when he got inside the house, the farmer soon ended the career of the remarkable animal."

According to Jewett, the animal must have been stricken with rabies. The head is being sent to Mr. Jewett's office in Portland for inspection.

Magazine Executive Attempts Suicide

NEW YORK, Nov. 16 (AP)—Signa Seaborn, 21, former fiancée of William T. Todd an executive of the magazine "Good Housekeeping," shot and seriously wounded herself in his Brooklyn apartment early today, police said.

Todd told the police that when he entered his rooms he found the door open, with Miss Seaborn bleeding from a bullet wound in her breast. He notified police who say that Miss Seaborn admitted she shot herself.

Todd said he could not explain how she obtained a key to his apartment. The weapon she used belonged to Todd who was arrested on a charge of having firearms without a permit. Todd said he had been engaged to Miss Seaborn for a year but the engagement was broken recently after a quarrel. Hospital surgeons said she probably would die.

BUILD NEW HOSPITAL.
GRANTS PASS, Ore., Nov. 14, (AP)—Construction of a new county hospital to cost \$50,000 was assured here today when \$10,000 required by public subscription for the furnishing of law building was raised. The county court appropriated \$50,000 of the Oregon and California land grant refund for the structure. Management of the hospital will be in the hands of a board elected from the shareholders who contributed the \$10,000.
