Baker Co. Conference On.—

The Baker County agricultural conference is on, opening session being held yesterday, with a large attendance of farmers and producers of our neighbor county in attendance. A number of specialists are present to assist with the discussions along various lines and in the list we note the following: Harry Avery, county agriculturalist of this county; Prof. G. R. Hyslop, of O. A. C., head of Farm Crops department; N. C. Jamison, dairy specialist; E. E. Price, soils and irrigation specialist; E. L. Potter, head of animal husbandry department.

Does Practical Work.—

Each subordinate organization of the grange is expected to undertake one piece of outstanding community work each year. The grange at Eagle Valley has recently taken upon themselves the gravelling of the lane which leads into the cemetery in that community, and the work is going right forward.

Community Hall At Mt. Glen Is Making Headway

Work is progressing very rapidly on the new community hall, being erected adjacent to the Mt. Glen L. D. S. church, out from Island City. The hall is a decided community project, with all residents of that vicinity, whether members of this particular church or not, interested in the project and also contributing to it. While it will be used primarily perhaps for services connected with the work of the church, it will be in no wise confined to that, but will be open for social and educational gatherings of all kinds as residents of the community may desire. The one outstanding idea in its erection, according to officials of the church is to foster or create a finer community spirit.

The building, when completed, will consist of a large, full-ceilinged basement and above that a recreation hall. It will be 32 feet wide by 50 feet long, will be of frame construction with the basement walls etc., of concrete. The architect's estimate of the cost of the structure was \$13,000, but some alterations may be made, cutting that figure to around \$10,000. All of the labor in connection with the building will be volunteered. According to the law of the church, the general organization meets the local subscription 50-50, that is, the church matches every dollar contributed by the local church, by patrons of the church, or by any friends of the enterprise.

The basement will consist of class rooms for various classes of the Sunday school—there will be six of these. There will also be rooms to be used by the Mutual Improvement association, children's meetings and also other meetings of a religious type. It will be very commodious, well lighted and well ventilated. The basement will also accommodate the furnace which will heat the entire building.

The main floor, or upper floor, of the building will be the recreation hall, with some equipment for athletic games etc. The original plans call for a temporary stage. Its promoters say of it, that it will be arranged and furnished to meet the needs of the community.

It is next run through a Carter disc separator, this process followed by a wind grader. The grain is then ready for grinding. In the process of preparation, part of the bran and all the fine particles are sifted out. It should have been stated also that, at the very first, the grain is graded for size.

It will be seen that "Health Nuggets" is a pure wheat preparation the whole process to which this wholesome grain is subjected being confined to grading, cleaning and grinding. Its properties remain unchanged and there is nothing added to it. It is wheat put up in a clean, and palatable form. To be served, it is prepared like any other wheat cereal.
