SHANGHAI, Nov. 17 (AP)—Severe fighting along the Tientsin-Pukow railway north of Mingwang is indicated in the arrival at Nanking of 11 serious casualty cases.

It appears that 50,000 nationalists under General Hoyn-chang attacked the forces of the northern commander, General Sun Chuan-fang, on a wide front only to suffer the most severe losses, especially from machine gun fire.

One nationalist division was decimated. A regiment was reduced to 40 or 50 men.

HONGKONG, Nov. 17 (AP)—The labor party under Chang Fui-fai has attempted to seize Canton, reports from there to Chinese sources here say.

"Trouble broke out when the attempt was made at 8 o'clock last night. Gun fire between the contending parties kept up all night and at 4 o'clock this morning became very heavy. Desultory firing continued until 8 a. m.

Martial law has been declared. The gates to the foreign settlement have been closed.

CONCORD, N. H., Nov. 17, (AP)—Charles S. Mellen, formerly president of the New York, New Haven and Hartford railroad, and the Boston and Maine railroad, died today at his home here. He retired from active railroad work some time ago.
