

FARM RELIEF NO SIMPLE MATTER

Permanent Aid Requires Adjustments of Many Problems, Is Opinion

CHICAGO, Nov. 17. (AP)—Permanent farm relief requires adjustments of many national problems in addition to board agriculture legislation, a special committee reported today to the American Association of Land Grant colleges and universities.

"Agricultural legislation is a far broader question than a single act of congress designed to alleviate the present situation," the report said. "Any proposal that confuses the minds of the public by encouraging the idea that a single emergency relief act would meet the difficulties under which the farmer operates is prejudicial to the interests of agriculture."

Revising the agricultural situation the committee reported that since 1920 agriculture has received only about 10 per cent of the total income of the United States as compared with about 20 per cent during the ten years previous.

Some of the methods for hastening improvement of the conditions were summarized as follows:

and number of live stock, with holding new land from cultivation, greater use of storage facilities, sound marketing and favorable and sound farm legislation.

Formulation of state programs for equalizing the tax burden.

Early completion of investigation of freight rates and prompt action in putting into effect such readjustments as can be made.

Making credit from the federal intermediate credit banks available to cooperative buying associations as well as cooperative selling organizations.

Keeping tariff rates on agricultural products on a level with those on other products of industry.

Thomas J. Cooper of the University of Kentucky is chairman of the committee which submitted the report.
