Bridge Pointers

This week we considered in connection with the informative table situations which are of a more difficult character than those that usually arise. Two hands were given each day and the answers the next day.

YESTERDAY'S HANDS

NO. 9
 ♠ A-X-X
 ♥ A-X-X
 ♦ A-X-X
 ♣ J-X-X-X

NO. 10
 ♠ J-X
 ♥ A-X-X
 ♦ A-X-X-X
 ♣ A-X-X-X

Both of these hands are held by South (Dealer); the first round bidding having been:

South West North East
 1 No Trump Double Pass Pass
 What should South declare on the second round?

No. 9. South should redouble. This is the declaration known as the S. O. S. redouble, made only after a Business Pass. All other redoubles show strength, an assurance that the contract will be made, and a desire to increase the size of it by a redouble; but a redouble made after an adversary has been strong enough to double informatively and the other strong enough to make a Business Pass, is an acknowledgment of certain defeat and a demand upon the partner to bid his longest suit no matter how weak it may be, so that probably will get a smaller loss than the doubled declaration. In this case South has a weak No Trump, but with Ace and two others in three suits and Jack and three others in the remaining suit, the loss probably will be lighter

with North's longest suit the trump than at No Trump. At the worst, North and South will have one more trump than the combined hands of the adversaries, and North may have a five-card suit or four clubs, making the trump advantage still greater. While the redouble must result in increasing the commitment by one, it is apt to increase the trick-taking power of the combined

hands by more than one and furnish the best line of retreat.

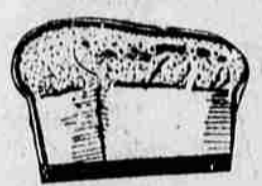
No. 10. South should pass. This hand has exactly the same high-card strength as No. 9 and therefore the S. O. S. redouble has the same appeal; but an S. O. S. redouble is a dangerous expedient when the hand contains a suit with only two cards, and especially so when the short suit is a Major. There is too much probability that the S. O. S. will be answered with a four-carder, the adversaries will have more trumps than Declarer. An S. O. S. in a case like this not only advertises distress, but probably will increase it.

1 egg
2 tablespoons sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons dry mustard
1/2 teaspoon paprika
1/2 cup vinegar
1/2 cup Mazola
1 cup water
4 tablespoons Argo or King-ford's Cornstarch.

Put egg, sugar, seasoning, vinegar and Mazola in a mixing bowl but DO NOT STIR. Make a paste by mixing the Corn Starch with 1/2 cup water, add additional 1/2 cup water and cook over slow fire, stirring constantly until it boils and clears up. Add hot cornstarch mixture to ingredients in mixing bowl and beat briskly with Dover egg beater. Cool before serving.
