Sayre, and among them are some clubs in localities where the work has not been carried on before.

Observance of Health Rules Aids In Checking Epidemics, Is Report

"If the rules as suggested by the various state and local health officials, as well as by the children, to whom they have been especially addressed, they could do much to help curb not only infantile paralysis, by every communicable and infectious disease," said county health nurse, Miss Alice Marquart, yesterday. "There have been many rumors floating around over the county in regard to prevalence of contagious diseases of one kind and another, but when such cases have been investigated, it has been found that the reports were very largely exaggerated. In fact, there is very little contagion throughout the county at the present time."
