GILES TAKES OFF ON TRIP TO HONOLULU

side the field staff and the newspapermen.

Captain A. T. Peterson, flight manager, announced that if Giles' flight was successful to Honolulu he would follow him on the next available boat.

Captain Giles for the greater part of his flight will encounter what the San Francisco weather bureau termed "medium good weather" with the winds mostly north and northeast all the way. The flier should not run into rains or atmospheric disturbances until the vicinity of the islands is reached, where local showers are reported.

Weather to Grow Warmer

From a temperature of 58 degrees outside the Golden Gate the aviator will gradually note warmer temperatures until the area near the islands where an average temperature of 70 degrees is the rule.

It was announced at the field that arrangements had been made with seven ships between here and Honolulu to give Giles his bearings by flag signals in the daylight hours and by flares at night.

Due in 24 Hours

Loaded, his plane was expected to make about 90 miles an hour, gradually increasing its speed to 165 miles an hour as the burden is lightened. It was figured he would arrive over Honolulu in about 26 hours, barring difficulties.

According to the positions of ships known to be on the great circle route, Giles will face a gap of about 1900 miles between the hours of 7 a. m. and 5 a. m. Pacific time, without seeing any vessels.

HORTA, Island of Fayal, Azores, Nov. 22 (AP)—The Junkers seaplane D-1230 started at 6 o'clock tonight from Horta for Harbor Grace, Newfoundland, on a transatlantic flight to the U. S.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 22 (AP)—The lookout station of the marine department of the San Francisco chamber of commerce reported that Captain Frederick A. Giles was sighted over the Farallone islands, 30 miles out, at 7:50 a. m.
