TURKEY PRICES ARE IRREGULAR

Other Poultry Fairly Firm—Eggs Slightly Lower, Butter Steady

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 22 (AP)—Wholesale turkey prices are decidedly irregular on the local market today with a distinct tendency toward weakness. Unusually heavy receipts, together with a small demand have tended to keep prices considerably below those of last year. Prime birds are quoted all the way from 40¢ to 45¢, with most sales around 41 and 42¢.

Other poultry is fairly firm, with prices quoted as follows: Peking ducks, 20¢ to 25¢; geese, 28¢ to 30¢; capons around 40¢; light hens, 16¢ to 17¢, and heavy hens, 22¢ to 23¢.

Dairy exchange egg prices are lower on extras and firsts while other grades are holding steady. Extras are 2½¢ lower at 43¢; and standard firsts are down 2¢ to 38¢. Local dealers anticipate a further easing in the egg market during the next few weeks.

Butter prices are steady. Cauliflower is firm at \$1.50 per crate.

Potatoes are plentiful at \$1 to \$1.50 per cwt. for Yukonias. Few local potatoes are offered.

Oregon yellow Danvers onions are selling easily at \$1.75, while the Washington Spanish type are going at \$2.

Bulls Again in Control; Market Specialty Affair

NEW YORK, Nov. 22 (AP)—Speculators for the advance retained control of today's stock market which was largely a specialty affair. Standard Industrials and rails again failed to make much headway. Gains of 3 to nearly 8 points were scattered throughout the list with about a score issues, including such favorites as Packard, Hupp, Radio, International Paper and Anaconda, again touching new high records.

Midland Steel Products preferred continued a sensational advance by soaring 7 1/2 points to a new high. Otis Steel Preferred jumped 5 1/2 points and Transue and Williams 3. Norfolk and Western featured the rail group by reaching a new high record at 29 1/2.

The closing was irregular. Dupont fell back more than 5 points. Brick building continued for various stocks which ordinarily are neglected, notably Peoria and Eastern, American Republics and Advance Rumely preferred, advances running to 3 points or more. Total sales approximated 2,300,000 shares.
