Chang Tso-Lin Crowns Himself Chinese Emperor

LONDON, Nov. 23. (AP)—A dispatch to the Evening News from Tokyo says that Japanese correspondents in Peking report that the northern generalissimo, Chang Tso-Lin, is now preparing almost openly to crown himself emperor. Coronation robes have been ordered from Moscow, where the best silk is obtainable. The Manchurian chieftain, who heads the northern military alliance will proclaim his era "the military mountain era." He will rename China "the mighty expansive empire."

The throne of China became vacant on Feb. 12, 1912, when the country became a republic although the last Manchurian emperor, Pu Yi, retained the title of emperor of the Manchurian imperial house up to Nov. 5, 1924.

Mustang Defeats Blue-Blood Field

CHICAGO, Nov. 23. (AP)—Aviator, a bony mustang pony from Nebraska, which hung its head as though he felt out of place with the thoroughbreds at the Chicago horse show last night, was a blue ribbon winner nevertheless. In an exhibition of sensational riding, Miss Eleanor Getzeneder, 19, of Champion, Neb., negotiated every jump in the lightweight hunter class and horse and rider jumped their way into the hearts of the 2500 spectators.

FUNERAL ARRANGED.—SALEM, Ore., Nov. 23. (AP)—The funeral of the Rev. Geo. W. Gagnan, 89, who died at Turlock, Cal., will be held here today from the First Methodist church, where he served as pastor from 1892 to 1898. Lucky 13 To Get Turkey at Home

EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 23. (AP)—Although the edict that they will remain in Eugene over Thanksgiving was accepted with general good will by University of Oregon students yesterday, the offices of the dean of men and dean of women were besieged by students seeking special permission to leave for their homes, and by telephone and telegraph messages from parents backing up their pleas.

Thirteen permits—six to men and seven to women students—were granted out of the near 100 who applied. To have granted more, it was pointed out by Elmer Shirrell, dean of men, would have been to defeat the purpose of the holiday ban, which was clamped down Monday night in an effort to prevent the spread of influenza parasites by students contracting the disease in their home towns.

Inquest Under Way At Marshfield, Ore.

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Nov. 23. (AP)—An inquest was being held today into the death of Caleb Green, 56, bachelor, who was slain Monday at his home at Catching Inlet. Robert Green, resident of the adjoining ranch was being held for investigation following reports of neighbors that the two had quarreled. Although having the same name the two men are no relation. A saved off baseball bat found near the scene of the crime was believed by officers to have been the implement used by the assailant.

Poison Liquor Fatal Again In Spokane, Wash.

SPOKANE, Nov. 23. (AP)—The second death here in three days ascribed to poison liquor occurred in the hospital ward of the county jail last night. It was reported today. Ed Lyon, 38, said to have been the son of a wealthy Colfax rancher, and a veteran of the world war, died in the jail ward after he had been removed there when nurses in a hospital where he was a patient had reported they were unable to control him.

Mell McNece, aged 49, was found dead in his bed in the county jail Monday morning. Jailers were informed he had been drinking heavily.

A third man is said to be in critical condition from poison liquor in the hospital ward of the jail, with little hope held for his recovery.

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were very thick and low and there was incessant rain squalls. There wasn't much wind but the 'pockets' were awful.

"Finally my ship dropped into one of these and before I knew it she was upside down. The ship went 'haywire' utterly uncontrollable. The gas in the main tanks were then overloaded, you know. Even for normal flying it was a strain on the ship, but in the inverted position the strain was tripled. So while we were flying there inverted, the center section bracing wires snapped.

Dumps Gasoline
"I managed to right the ship at

the critical moment, although while we were inverted I lost all my charts, food and signal flares. "I dumped my gasoline then with the bracing wires gone so as to relieve the load. "I only dumped my main tanks, keeping enough in the wings to fly me back to the coast—I hoped. I made a rough guess and steered for the mainland, and finally after sighting the shore about 60 miles north of where I finally landed, I found in landing place in a creek bed at San Simeon. I honestly never expected to make the mainland; I was simply flying against hope, that's all."

Saw No Ships
Captain Giles landed at San Simeon at 3:20 yesterday afternoon. During the approximately eight hours he was in the air he reported sighting no ships. The last report of Captain Giles after he left San

Francisco was from the Farallone Islands, a few miles from the Golden Gate.

Three days ago when Giles made his first hop-off from San Francisco he was forced back when he ran into heavy fog 30 miles at sea.

Giles last night planned to return to San Francisco today, later more definite plans for his next ocean flight attempt will be made.
