

TURKEY MARKET SHOWS WEAKNESS

Seconds Selling as Low as 25 Cents a Pound—Receipts Are Heavy

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 23 (AP)—All kinds of prices are being quoted on the local wholesale turkey market today, with a decided tendency toward weakness. Some dealers are getting as low as 25c for seconds, up to 40c for the best offerings. Most of the birds are moving around 40c, (unusually heavy receipts, together with the small demand this year are given as reasons for the irregularity of the market. There is almost no sale for other classes of poultry wholesale dealers report, and the weakness of the market is even more pronounced than in the turkey division. Receipts are heavy and the market slow. Hens are lower, moving in small volume at from 15 to 21c, while spring stock is quoted from 15 to 24c. Live ducks are quoted 23 to 24c, dressed 28 to 29c.

Dressed veal and hogs are fairly steady, although the market is perhaps a shade easier. Veal is quoted 15 to 16 1/2c, while hogs are at 13c top for the very best light animals. Egg prices today are unchanged from yesterday's quotations, both at the dairy exchange and the poultry association. Butter prices are likewise steady.

In the produce division there are only slight fluctuations and nearly all prices are firm. Extra fancy Newton apples brought \$2.25 in carload lots at Hood River yesterday.

Specialties Go Higher in Wall Street Trading

NEW YORK, Nov. 23 (AP)—Speculative interest in today's stock market centered in about a score of specialties, which soared 4 to 12 points. Standard industrial and rails held fairly steady, meeting good support on reactions, but also encountering large offerings on the rally.

Some selling came into U. S. Steel common but it was checked. Otis Steel Prior preferred soared 11 points to a new high at 91 on reports that the company would earn more than double its \$7 dividend this year. National Lead jumped nearly 10 points to a new top at 135, and Brooklyn Edison advanced 7 points to a new peak at 124. Buying of the rails was held in check by the publication of relatively poor October earnings reports by the Southern Pacific, Wash and Western Maryland roads. Special strength developed, however, in the "300" issues, each of which advanced 3 points or more. The closing was firm. Prices of railroads, especially the coalters, began to bulge in the late dealings, when profit taking started in many of the earlier strong industrials. Lehigh valley ran up 6 and Reading, Union Pacific, Canadian Pacific and several other investment railroads 2 to 3 points. Total sales approximated 2,850,000 shares.

Wheat Unsettled And a Cent Lower

CHICAGO, Nov. 23 (AP)—Starting at 1/4 to 3/4c off, wheat soon showed a material further drop. Corn, oats and provisions were also weak, corn opening unchanged to 1/4c lower and subsequently sagging all around.

Wheat closed unsettled, 1/4 to 1/2c lower; corn 1/4 to 3/4c off; oats unchanged to 1/4c down; provisions unchanged to 1/2c decline.

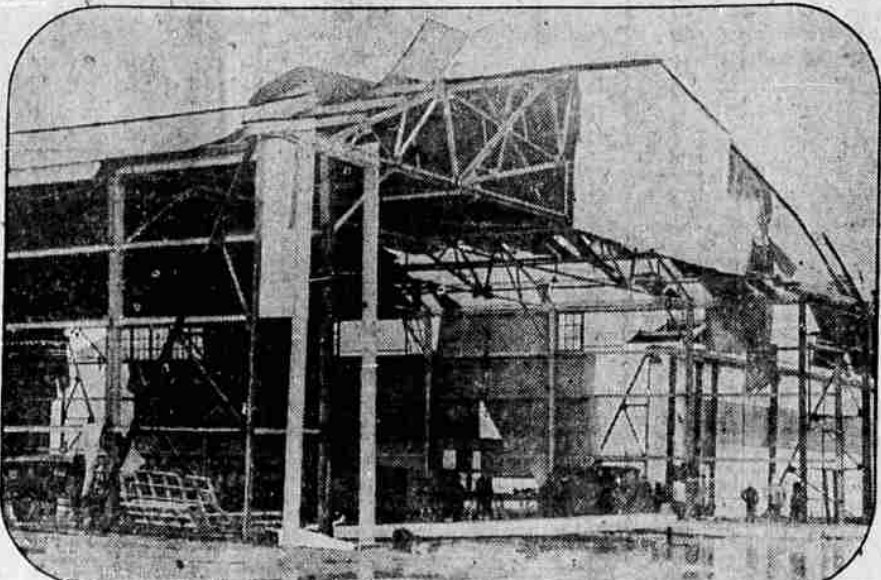
