THREE BIG GAMES ON SLATE TODAY

Mac-Hi and Ontario Play for Title—Pendleton Is Facing Baker Eleven

Eastern Oregon football interest is centered in three "big" games today—one of which is expected to definitely settle the 1927 championship.

At the Ontario High school stadium the victorious Mac-Hi eleven and the Ontario High school team, both with perfect records in this state, are battling for supremacy this afternoon. Although Ontario defeated Baker and Mac-Hi only broke even with the Bulldogs, fans are predicting a Milton-Freewater win largely because of the size and aggressiveness of the line and the versatility of the backfield, centering around Hufford, triple threat man. Mac-Hi, by winning today, would gain a second consecutive championship and would also win the right to play The Dalles for the all-Eastern Oregon championship.

Baker vs. Pendleton
Another contest that is attracting much interest in the traditional clash between the Pendleton and Baker teams at Round-Up park. Baker has been defeated but once and on the other hand won from La Grande 71 to 6, from Enterprise 7 to 6, from Union 25 to 6 besides other victories. Pendleton lost to The Dalles 13 to 6, to Milton-Freewater 49 to 6 and defeated Hill Military 29 to 6 and La Grande 12 to 0. A victory over Pendleton would undoubtedly put Baker in either second or third rating among strong teams in this section of the state.

The third game of more than ordinary interest is being played in La Grande with the Tigers facing the Union eleven—another traditional contest. Union has defeated La Grande but once in the memory of local grid fans. In 1925 she won 6 to 3 here. Last year the Tigers retaliated with a 2 to 6 victory at Union. This year the teams are believed to be about on par and a hard fought game is assured.

Enterprise Strong
Up in Wallowa county Enterprise High school, by virtue of a victory over Wallowa, Joseph, La Grande and a tie with Union, has claims for at least some of the 1927 football honors. Enterprise's only defeat this year was at the hands of Baker and the score was only 7 to 6.

Hereford Record Good
Another strong team among the smaller Eastern Oregon schools this year is the Hereford aggregation, which is undefeated, although it did not meet Baker, Pendleton.

Changes Made in Basketball Rules; Dribble, However, Remains the Same

SPOKANE, Nov. 24 (Special)—Basketball rules as published in the 1927-28 edition of Spalding's basketball guide show the following changes in the playing code which go into effect this season:

Rule 5, section 6—A note is inserted urging teams not to use numbers 1 and 2 in numbering players.

Rule 6, section 13—A question and answer have been inserted giving the referee authority to designate which timekeeper operates the watch in case of disturbance.

Less Tooting
Rule 5, section 5—When the ball is tossed up between two players, the whistle is not to be blown except at the beginning of the play.

Rule 11, section 3—Time is to be taken out on all fouls, but the watch is to be stopped at the instant the foul is called until: (a) in the case of technical fouls, or double fouls, the ball is tossed up at center; (b) in the case of personal fouls, the ball is placed at the disposal of the free thrower for the free throw, or for the last free throw if a multiple free throw is awarded.

Rule 11, section 3—If the ball is in play and in the possession of a player when "time out" is called that player puts the ball in play from out of bounds when play is resumed.

Rule 14, section 14—When a player dribbles and throws for a lay-up, he may recover the ball and dribble again after the ball has touched the basket or backboard.

Rule 15, section 1, note—On a jump ball, if the ball drops without being tapped by either jumper, it is to be tossed up again even though one player catches it before it reaches the floor. This is not to be interpreted as permitting a player to jump and catch the ball.

References to questions and answers have been inserted in the rules alongside the sections to which they apply.

Special comment on kicking the ball, passing the ball in from out of bounds, and touching the ball to the floor, is included in questions and answers Nos. 59, 57 and 27. In playing the ball in from out of bounds a player is not permitted to touch the boundary line unless the space out of bounds is limited.

No change has been made in the dribble. Last April the joint rules committee, representing the Young Men's Christian association, the Amateur Athletic association, started basketball world by announcing a new rule limiting the dribble to a single bounce. Subsequently the committee reversed its decision, and in an article on this subject Editor Oswald Tower explains why the rule was revoked although the committee is still of the opinion that the change is desirable.

Regulation Court Discussed
The question of an ideal standard court has been under discussion and a sub-committee has been appointed to make a study of the matter. It is hoped to reach a decision as to what are the ideal dimensions for a basketball court, thereby established a standard which can be followed in new construction. A definite statement will probably be ready for publication in the guide a year hence.

The guide is much larger than in previous years due to the remarkable growth of basketball. The reviews comprise an account of the game in every important sectional association, reports of individual organizations, records, intercollegiate basketball and the approved list of games officials registered with the committee. MORE GERMAN NITROGEN
RELIAN (AP)—Expansion of the German atmospheric fixation industry has resulted in the returning to German soil of almost twice as much artificial nitrogen as before the World war. A manufacturing plant at Melsburg produces 300,000 tons of fixed nitrogen annually and another at Oppau bei Ludwigshafen produces an additional 100,000 tons. The combined output is equal to domestic consumption. Two calcium cyanamide plants produce 7,000 tons annually, from 60,000 to 75,000 tons obtained from coke and gas plants, and there are minor sources of supply. Germany once imported 125,000 tons of Chilean nitrate of soda to meet its needs, but now exports 150,000 tons of fixed nitrogen annually.

Cartwright To Fight Blackwell Saturday Night
The most exciting contest of the season at Enterprise is to be staged Saturday, Nov. 26, in the Community hall at 9 p. m., with Eddie Cartwright, 154, of Portland vs. Joe Blackwell, 152, of Imbaha. Cartwright is described as a corner in Northwest pugilistic circles and Blackwell, in recent fights, has proven his desirability as a main event matchup.

Three five-round bouts are also on the card, which will be held under the auspices of the Enterprise American Legion post.

E. M. Morrison, of Enterprise, will meet Thurston Lay, of Joseph. The former weighs 155 pounds and the latter in a pound lighter.

Bobby Steele, of Wallowa, will fight Merl Berry, of Enterprise, and Glenn Matthews, of Joseph, will face Raymond Davis, of Enterprise.

HAWAIIAN RANCHES GROW
HONOLULU (AP)—Little ranching has become the third largest industry in Hawaii. The cattle number 145,000 head, with an appraised value of 3,500,000, and capital invested in ranch property exceeds \$12,000,000.

Farm Pointers
After the cups are hung and the first streak out in working pine woods for turpentine, several weeks should elapse before regular chipping begins. A better yield thus is obtained. If cups are hung in November or December, it is desirable to cut a second streak some weeks before regular work starts.

To produce a good flow of milk, a dairy cow requires certain kinds of proteins. No one feed supplies these in sufficient quantities. By combining a variety of feeds, however, the desired result can be obtained. Alfalfa hay, silage, linseed oil meal or cottonseed meal, bean, and ground corn make a good combination.

Logs or stumps of the black walnut have a market value of from \$150 to \$200 a thousand feet. By liberal planting of seed, farmers in the upland and hill sections of the South, the Ohio River basin, or the central Mississippi Valley regions, may obtain good returns from both the nut and the timber when ready for harvesting. The U. S. forestry service urges every farmer to "plant a bushel of black walnuts this winter."

To prevent stored ice from melting, make the ice house air tight at the bottom, so the cold air inside will not filter out. There should be at least 12 inches of sawdust for insulation, packed around the sides of the ice stack, and underneath and on top of the stack. It is important to drain out through an air tight trap any water that may form at the bottom of the stack.

Galvanized iron pails should not be used for milking because the acids in milk act on this metal and they also are hard to clean. Neither is it advisable to use buckets made of wood or other porous substances. Dairy utensils always should be made of material that is non-absorbent, easily cleaned, and not readily affected by milk.

Lengthening the hen's working day during the winter months, by putting artificial light in the poultry house and increasing her feed consumption with a view to greater egg production, is advisable within reasonable limits. Overstimulation of the hen may cause a spring molt or other undesirable results with a consequent lower egg yield.

Disregarding the cost of his own labor, materials and curing, the owner saves an average of \$15 on every hog he slaughters himself. A 200-pound hog will render about 20 to 25 pounds of lard and a 200-pound animal about 50 pounds of lard.

CALDWELL, Idaho (Special)—Damages of \$10,000 are asked from the Idaho Canning company which operates a plant at Wilder, in an complaint filed in district court here by G. E. Burkett, Wilder farmer.

In September, the plaintiff alleges, he was badly injured while attempting to deliver corn to the Wilder cannery when part of the loading platform apparatus which he contends, was defective, tossed him into the air. As a result, he claims he is crippled for life.
