## MENUS

**By SISTER MARY**  
Breakfast—Pears, cereal cooked with dates, cream, crisp waffles, syrup, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Creamed eggs and mushrooms, spinach salad, graham rolls, Indian pudding, milk, tea.  
Dinner—Stuffed pork tenderloin, potatoes au gratin, buttered cauliflower and carrots, apple and celery salad, apricot pudding, milk, coffee.

Children under 18 years of age should not be allowed to drink tea or coffee in any form. Babies should not be given toast dipped in mother's or father's coffee. Coffee has no more actual food value than so much hot water and if the toast is softened, its end is defeated since it is the crispness and effort of chewing wherein its value lies.

**Creamed Eggs and Mushrooms**  
Six hard "boiled" eggs, 1/2 pound or one cup sliced fresh mushrooms, 2 tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons flour, 1 1/2 cups thin cream, 1 egg yolk, 1 teaspoon lemon juice, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper.

Melt butter and add mushrooms cleaned and sliced. Cover and cook over a low fire for five minutes. Stir, egg, flour and stir with a fork until blended. Slowly add 1 1/2 cups cream, stirring constantly. Bring to the boiling point and season with salt and pepper. Let remaining cream with yolk of egg and stir into mixture. Add hard cooked eggs cut in slices and stir carefully until hot. Add lemon juice and serve. The mixture can be served on triangles of toast, in patty shells or between split individual baking powder biscuits. It offers an excellent suggestion to the woman in the country who has eggs, cream and mushrooms for the "mattering."

## SKYSCRAPER FOR SYDNEY

## Bridge Pointers

This week our tests are upon the question of how a Declarer should plan his campaign. Two hands are given each day, and the way the Declarer should plan to play them is explained on the succeeding day.

**YESTERDAY'S HANDS**

WEST LEADS: ♠ 4-3-2, ♥ 10-9, ♦ K-9-7-5-3, ♣ 6-4

NORTH (DECLARER): ♠ A-K-Q-9-8-6-5, ♥ 10-9, ♦ A-K-8-2, ♣ 2

WEST LEADS: ♠ J-10-2, ♥ K-8, ♦ 9-8-7-5-2, ♣ 8-5-2

NORTH (DECLARER): ♠ A-K-Q-9-8-6-3, ♥ 7-5, ♦ A-K-4, ♣ A

In both Nos. 7 and 8, Spades are trump and the original lead is the

Queen of Clubs which, in No. 7, won and a Club was led to the second trick. How should Declarer plan his campaign?

No. 7. Declarer, trumping the second trick, can see that in addition to the Club which he has lost, he must lose one Diamond and two Hearts unless he is able to discard "Closed" Hands—losing Hearts on Dummy's Diamonds. His best chance to do this is to lead three rounds of trumps even if the adverse trumps are divided 2-2, and then lead a small Diamond and duck it. If East makes the mistake of leading another Club, Declarer can discard both his losing Hearts and make game, provided the adverse Diamond division be as he has a right to expect. Of course, East may not fall into the trap and may lead a Heart, not a Club; but he surely will not lead a Club unless Dummy's last trump is taken out. Not advisable to lead more trumps as adverse discards might be too informative.

No. 8. Declarer must win the first trick and should then lead Ace and King of trumps, probably drawing all adverse trumps. He should then lead his small Diamond. If West win, he will be

In both of the above hands the Declarer is playing a Heart contract, and the original lead is the King of Spades.
