There is agitation in some Latin-American diplomatic circles because the League of Nations is going to send an "observer" to the Pan American conference in Havana next January. Still, it need not be hastily assumed that there is any deep, dark conspiracy on the part of the league to butt unduly into American affairs. It might have been more tactful if the Pan-American governments had all been consulted. Still, they're nearly all members of the league. The United States, while driven to do a little more serious thinking about the Monroe Doctrine, is in no very good position to object, because our government has unofficial observers at Geneva whenever there is anything important going on.

## NON-VOTING VOTERS

Considerably more interest than usual was shown in many local elections this year. But figures show that many eligible voters do not exercise their privilege, or duty, of voting. Furthermore, even those voters who do go to the polls and vote on the more exciting issues often leave some of their ballots unmarked.

In Passaic, N. J., the election issues did not strike many voters as important, so the vote was small enough to be easily analyzed. There were 4518 ballots counted; 35 were thrown out. Of those voting it was found that 611 did not vote for senator, 502 did not vote for sheriff, 221 did not vote for assemblyman and 268 did not vote for freeholder. A parks question and road bonds were up for decision; 1782 electors failed to vote on the former and 1935 did not vote on the latter. "A study of the total vote," says the Passaic Daily News, "would indicate that from three to four hundred electors voted practically a blank ballot."

This may have been caused by carelessness, some of the voters simply overlooking certain ballots although they had opinions they might have expressed. Or it may have been the result of indifference, voters not caring enough about the issues to take the trouble to vote on them. Perhaps, though this seems less likely, these blanks were the result of sudden attacks of conscience, the voters feeling that they didn't know the candidate or understand the issue well enough to express a choice one way or another.

It is a curious situation. Obviously you can entice voters to the polls but you can't make them do a complete job of voting after they get there.

CHICAGO, Nov. 25 (AP)—At last the Notre-Dame football team has coaxed one of its greatest inter-sectional rivals, the University of Southern California into its own neighborhood, though to meet the record-breaking demand for tickets the boys of Knute Rockne had to take their Saturday spectacle to the largest stadium in the Middle West, Soldier in Chicago's Grant park.

The Trojans of Los Angeles and the Irish of Notre Dame will find the weather man acting as though he expected to be given a couple of tickets to the game. A gloomy Thanksgiving, just a little too cool to rain, brightened somewhat over night, tempering the November climate in honor of the Southern Californians. The gridiron was covered over so that has been virtually unaffected by the drizzle. Short stops en route yesterday enabled the western invaders to work out the train stiffness, making conditions fairly even between the two squads. True, the Notre Dame team has not lost one of its best backs as have the Trojans, who were forced to leave at home Don Williams with an injured leg. The burden of the offense thus has been laid on Morley Drury, the Southern Californian's candidate for all-American halfback.

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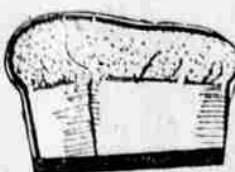
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
