New Englanders Mean "I Will Not" When They Say "I Do Not Choose"

NEW YORK, Nov. 25. (AP)—Calvin Coolidge's "I do not choose" in the language of New England means "I will not." It was indicated today in a statement of John Barrett, president of the National Vermont association, who polled the opinions of 70 Vermont and Massachusetts men on the president's now famous announcement.

When the president said "I do not choose to be a candidate for president in 1928," he meant unreservedly "I will not be a candidate," said Barrett announcing the result of his poll, which he said he made at the suggestion of members of his association.

The 70 opinions were received from 100 men and women "carefully selected for knowledge of Vermont and New England colloquialisms, and of President Coolidge's personality, character and habits of speech," Barrett said.

Polite But Firm

The opinions of the 70 were summarized, Barrett said, and they have all agreed upon the following report: "The common, long established and accepted significance of the phrase 'I do not choose to do this or that' has always been, according to that has always been, according to study of Vermont and New England phraseology and colloquialisms, a polite but firm and final form of saying 'I will not do this or that.'"

"The former phrase has even a stronger significance of personal attitude than the latter because it represents finality of judgment and choice while the latter might signify impolitic, abrupt and ill-considered refusal, which might, in turn, be subject to reversal on further thought."

How They Do It

"For example, when a Vermonter of the Coolidge type said 'I do not choose to go to church,' 'I do not choose to work for you,' 'I do not choose to vote for you,' 'I do not choose to let my daughter marry you' he always, politely but firmly means, 'I will not do this or that.'"

"President Coolidge could not have been more explicit and final even if he had added 'and I will not accept the nomination.'"

Barrett said a "high official" New Englander in Washington to whom he telegraphed the statement answered that "it is most clarifying responsible interpretation yet made."
