MAC-HI CHAMPION
FOR SECOND TIMEMilton-Freewater Eleven
Crushes Ontario 20 to 0
in Title Game

ONTARIO, Ore., Nov. 25.—McLoughlin school of Milton-Freewater won the Eastern Oregon football championship here yesterday in the third quarter of the game with Ontario, 20 to 0. On three spectacular plays, Hufford and Kreiger, McLoughlin stars, scored touchdowns. On a buck Kreiger broke from three tacklers and ran 45 yards for the first score. A minute later Hufford intercepted an Ontario forward pass and with perfect interference went 60 yards for the second touchdown. The third came on the kick-off following when Hufford caught the ball on his own five-yard line and dashed 95 yards through the center of the field.

In the other three quarters the teams played on even terms. Ontario twice threatened to score, once in the last three minutes of play by carrying the ball to McLoughlin's five-yard line.

HUSKIES DEFEAT
OREGON 7 TO 0Fumble Prevents Webfoot
Eleven from Scoring
Tying Touchdown

SEATTLE, Nov. 25 (AP)—The Oregon Webfoots ran true to form in the football game with the University of Washington Huskies yesterday, and although rated far below the powerful Washington team, battled their opponents to a standstill for the greater part of the game and lost only in the last six minutes of play when the Huskies punched across a lone touchdown. The try for extra point was successful and the game ended with the score 7 to 0.

In the closing minutes of the game Coach McEwen was forced to make many replacements as Oregon players were led or carried from the field unable to withstand the terrific pounding of the Husky run attack.

In the third period only a fumble prevented the Webfoots from getting a touchdown. Woodie, standing in midfield, buried a 20-yard pass to Wetzel who was in the clear. Wetzel snared the pass but as he turned toward the goal line the ball slipped from his fingers and the one great opportunity was gone. The game was witnessed by a crowd of 20,000.

Grant High Wins

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 25 (AP)—Grant High school yesterday won the Portland interscholastic football championship by defeating Washington high 6 to 0, nothing before a crowd of 10,000 spectators.

WALKER AND
BERLENBACH
MEET TONIGHT

CHICAGO, Nov. 25 (AP)—Two knockout artists whose mitts have proved their sleep-producing qualities, tangle at the Coliseum tonight for ten rounds—or less—with Mickey Walker, middleweight champion, trying to climb up to the light heavyweight throne over the prostrate form of Paul Berlenbach, the Astoria assassin of other days.

Berlenbach is just as devastating with his body punches as Walker has been with his shots at the jaw. It will be Berlenbach's first appearance in Chicago where Walker has grown to be a favorite, but even so, the betting odds are about even on the results.

In 9 4-5 Seconds

NATAL, South Africa (AP)—An athletic find has been made in Natal.

At the Dundee School sports, a boy named D. Joubert is reported to have run 100 yards in 9 4-5 seconds.

The time was challenged, but later in the afternoon an exhibition 100-yard race was held. Joubert, conceding ten yards, again returned 9 4-5 seconds, winning the race easily. Ten minutes later the same runner covered the 220 yards in 22 seconds and beat the field by 20 yards.

ARMY, NAVY TO
PLAY BEFORE
CROWD OF 75,000

NEW YORK, Nov. 25 (AP)—Hosts of the army and navy mobilized today in preparation for the annual griddon battle at the Polo Grounds tomorrow which will be witnessed by a throng upwards of 75,000.

The fighting forces from West Point have gone through a season marred only by a defeat from Yale and therefore are favored to vanquish their naval foes who have suffered sharp reversals from Notre Dame and Michigan. Notre Dame was an army victim.

Despite the remarkable ability displayed by the army players this season in the interception of passes, the middies have been perfecting their aerial technique evidently believing that a relentless air attack may prove the undoing of the land forces from West Point.

The army's main reliance will be in its great backfield with the brunt of the work falling on the shoulders of Captain Wilson, Red Carle, Nave and Murrell.

Sidelights on
Turkey Day Game

Looking to the future, La Grande fans got a great kick out of the backfield's improvement. Her pony quartet of freshmen found their stride. Evans, Rees, Faus and Harlow will make things interesting in Eastern Oregon football annals for three years more. They had today what La Grande has lacked all year—cohesion, coordination, unity and punch. The customary features that militated against success all season were eliminated by the shifting Coach Christie has effected.

In the line, which arose to the occasion and blocked punts when it meant saving the game, a new figure was conspicuous. It was Buchanan. Though a senior, he can graduate with the satisfaction that on several occasions yesterday he broke through from his tackle position and nabbed punts, as La Hughes of former years. Captain Bruce had his best foot forward all day and was a bear on recovering fumbles.

Charlton and Rice started at ends. Price taking Rice's place later. Bowman and Buchanan started at tackle with Guleman and Ketter at guards. They played singly and as a group far better than ever this year.

Conley plays stellar game. Conley, another trash, cheered

the hearts of local fans with promise of great things next year during the time he succeeded Harlow. Out of the disappointments and disasters of the year, the individual and collective attack and defense La Grande showed yesterday was almost to an open score.

Cox, the Union juggernaut of last year, remained in the game much of the time but the ball carrying was done by G. Miller, Taylor, Parent and J. Miller. Cox's injuries this fall reduced his effectiveness.

So dusty was the field that all distinctive markings on the players were early obliterated and there was no telling in the gathering twilight who had the ball nor even where the ball was. The fans had to wait the action of officials to determine what team might be on the ball after a fumble.

Union got away with a lateral pass and one forward pass.

Many Fumbles

Statistics lost all track of the number of times the ball slipped away, so often did this occur. None of these fumbles were blamed to players but to the weather man.

La Grande passed twice, successful for a short gain once and a failure once.

Union punted seven times varying from a five-yard loss to a 25-yard gain. La Grande had two 20-yard boots, two for no gain and one for 35. Others were in between. La Grande had by far the most first downs, by the ratio of three to one.

Union suffered heavily from low headed

penalties. An ever anxious sight flash brought repeated offside penalties and rough playing involved two 15-yard punishments. The routing was as spotted as a great game would be prompt. Standing in aish and muck two lines thick in many places, the fans on neither side let down for a moment. There was a reason for who ever saw a game with so many scoring chances, so many costly fumbles or so much shifting of flecks fortune?

The home fans had resigned themselves to another defeat before the safety game, but there was little remorse because the team out there in the mud was a new team with a new spirit. The difference between the Tigers yesterday and in the past would have been a salute had the year ended with a straight string of defeats.

La Grande knows just how Union feels about the game. Union took a game from La Grande in the last five minutes, the last time she played here. Both were hard to take.
