Minnesota loses Captain Herb Jactant, one of the greatest fullbacks the Middle West has seen, and several other stars in Dr. Spears' powerful machine.

Chicago loses virtually its entire line, including Captain Kenneth Home, a tower of strength to the Maroons.

On the Wisconsin team, "Fats" Crook, bears and Illinois will miss captain Bob Reitsch.

At Northwestern, Captain Vic Gustafson, a fellow townsman of Red Grange, and Tiny Lewis, the only effective ball carriers on the Purple squad, have finished their college football careers.

Berlenbach was wide open and took plenty of punishment. Walker hit him with everything, trying hard in the earlier rounds to put his man away. Berlenbach out-weighted Walker 173 1/2 to 161 pounds.
